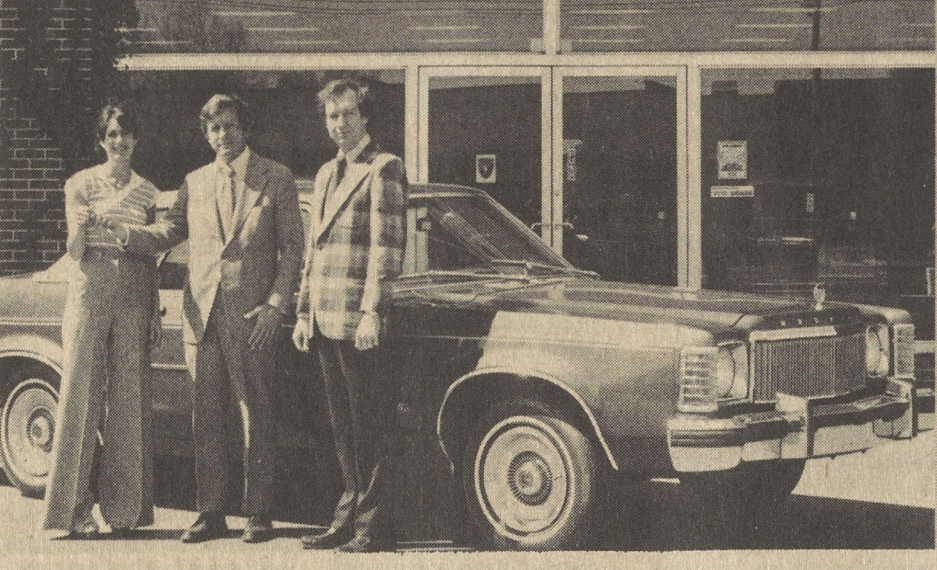

Air time each evening at 6:15 p.m. The entertaining auction game already has rounded up some great major gifts for this year's June 5-11 auction. The first major gift comes from David Ertley Inc., which operates the Ertley dealership at 310 Market St., Kingston. The Ertley dealership again has donated a new car to "Auction 44." The new car is a 1977 Mercury Monarch, valued at \$4,937. Ertley was the largest single donor to last year's auction. The two-door, 6 cylinder, 200 cubic inch engine Mercury Monarch includes full wheel covers, color-key nylon carpeting and opera windows. The Mercury Monarch will go to the highest bidder on "Auction 44's" final night, but bidding will be carried out each evening as the excitement increases.
