operating committee chairman for the consortium and a former member of the Girard School board, said a request had been made for the Supreme Court to hear the case in Pittsburgh in September.

'Contributions have been received from large metropolitan areas as well as small school districts, which indicates the broad base of support for our position in this case," he said. "We are enthused by the support of so many districts and pleased that the Supreme Court will hear this issue of statewide interest in September with the hope that local control or schools will be assured." 
