Family Services announces fall program

The Family Service Association of Wyoming Valley has announced its Family Life Education fall schedule. The Family Life Education Program uses information and group discussion to understand and anticipate the normal patterns and stress in todays changing family.

The Parents of Teenagers seminar has become one of the most popular of these programs. Group leader, William Roth, A.C.S.W., will begin the six session series on Thursday, Oct. 13, from 7 to 8:30 p.m.

The meetings will be held weekly, and some of the topics that will be covered include adolescent depression, teenage sexuality, drugs and limit

setting in a permissive society. Guest speakers will give information talks on these and other subjects.

The Women in Transition Program is offered for those women who are separated, divorced, or seriously considering separation from their husbands. The Group Leaders, Rebecca Osborn, A.C.S.W., and William Roth, A.C.S.W., will provide information concerning the legal and financial aspects of separation and divorce.

Other areas of discussion will include the problems of child rearing for the

separated woman, and the education and job opportunities available for her. Women in Transition is an ongoing series, so that women can join at any time and still attend all six sessions. The group meets on Wednesday afternoons from 1 to 3 p.m.

Family Service has instituted a new program which will be held for the first time this fall. It isentitled Considering Parenthood. This six session series will help couples decide whether or not to have a child.

The group leader, Cynthia Baron, M.S.W. will discuss the financial,

emotional, and physical aspects of child rearing, to aid couples in this very important decision. The weekly meetings will be held from 6 to 7:30 p.m. beginning Oct. 10.

Pre-registration for these programs is suggested because all of the groups will be limited in number. All meetings are held at Family Service, located at 73 West Union Street in Wilkes-Barre. All interested persons may receive additional information about these and other programs by calling or visiting the agency. Family Service is a United Way Agency.




