Dallas Schools ask cooperation

In cases of severe storm or other emergency situations which necessitate early dismissals and school closings, the Dallas School District has established a procedure to open lines of communications with parents and the news media.

During these times it is necessary for district personnel to make numerous telephone calls to various locations both in and out of the district. Once these emergency calls have been made, all other calls will be accepted and directed to the appropriate buildings.

This procedure is an attempt by the school to maximize communications that will insure the safety and well being of all students.

Past experiences have indicated that the multitude of incoming calls tie up the district telephone lines. The Dallas School District is requesting the cooperation of the community when such emergency situations arise.

The district is asking that parents refrain from calling the school district for the first one-half hour of the emergency. The switchboard operator will suggest to the parents who are calling during this

period to call back after the necessary emergency communications are completed.

Bachman notes increased smoking by teenage girls

State Health Secretary Dr. Leonard Bachman today said he is calling for a series of monthly "Stop Smoking Days" to point out the dangers of cigarette smoking to millions of Pennsylvanians who continue the habit.

"At least four million Pennsylvanians continue to endanger their health and those around them despite all the medical and statistical evidence that cigarette smoking can and does kill," Bachman said. "These national

statistics are ugly and reveal that 90,000 people die from lung cancer attributable to smoking every year.

"The Pennsylvania Health Department has a duty, an obligation, to continually communicate the dangers of smoking to the public especially in the face of the consequences to children and teenagers.

"The increase in smoking among teenagers, particularly young girls, is alarming. New anti-smoking efforts must be brought into Pennsylvania's grade schools at the lowest levels to combat the current trend," he said.

Bachman said he is calling for a "Stop Smoking Day" each month in 1978 in Pennsylvania in the hopes of convincing more and more Pennsylvanians each month that they should quit cigarette smoking for the sake of their own personal health.

"We're gearing up for a year-long anti-smoking health promotion which we hope will result in at least a million reformed cigarette smokers in Pennsylvania. We believe that's a reasonable goal," he said. "The Health Department campaign will include the issuing of posters and signs for work and home display along with other promotional materials now

being developed. Volunteer agencies, civic and union groups will be asked to assist."

The first "Stop Smoking Day" in Pennsylvania will be observed Thursday, January 26, according to Bachman.

National Education Week on Smoking is being conducted by the National Clearing House for Smoking and Health January 8-14 with the theme of "Break the Habit."
