Twice a day, something happens that helps keep your electric bill up.

Every family that waits till ofter eight can help cut down future peak demands for electricity. The need for future rate increases will tend to be reduced because we will not need as much new generating capacity to meet the increasing peak load.

Remember, the bulk of UGI's electricity is generated using less expensive coal. So, the use of electricity in off-peak periods costs less. It may take a while before the impact from

peak load reductions is reflected in our customers' electric bills. But, if we all start now, that change will come sooner.

So remember—always try to save energy. And one way to start is to wait till after eight!
