

# Dallas career program approved

John F. Rosser, principal of the Dallas Junior High School has announced that notification has been received from the Pennsylvania Vocational department of Education that it will support the continuation and expansion of the career education program which was

initiated during the 1976-77 school year. This program is called VEDA, the shortened version of the program titled Vocational Exploration: A Developmental Approach for Junior High School. Thomas Carr and Gordon Schlier, guidance counselors have been

appointed coordinators of this year's VEDA project. VEDA was developed by several junior high staff members to stimulate the student's thoughts about the world of work. The program will contain classroom activities intended to aid students in understanding themselves and the other people in

their daily lives. It is also intended help them to understand man-job relationships and how to go about making meaningful decisions in planning their lives.

The program has three phases to it: Phase I 7th Grade—"Exploring Yourself and Others"

The seventh-grade health teacher will be conducting class room activities throughout the year that will help students to understand themselves and others better. Exploring Self, a personal assessment survey, will be used to help the students gain understanding. Phase II 8th Grade—"Exploring Careers"

The eighth-grade teachers will conduct classroom activities throughout the year that will acquaint students with the various jobs and careers related to the subjects studied in school.

Phase III 9th Grade—"Making Meaningful Decisions" This part of the program will be conducted by two social studies teachers. The planned classroom activities will acquaint

students with a process for making meaningful decisions about jobs, careers, education, and their lives. In addition, the Ohio Vocational Interest Survey and Urban Man, two interest inventories, will be used to provide the students with additional educational and vocational information.

Another important component of the VEDA program is parental involvement. A series of informal workshops have been planned for the parents of students in Grades 7 and 9. Group sessions will be held one night a week for three weeks starting in March. Opportunities will be provided in these meetings for parents and teachers to discuss ways to assist students in the career decision-making process.

Registration forms that list the exact dates for these meetings will be sent home with the students. Parents of students in Grades 7 and 9 who wish to participate in this program should return these forms promptly. Additional information about VEDA may be obtained by contacting the school's guidance office.

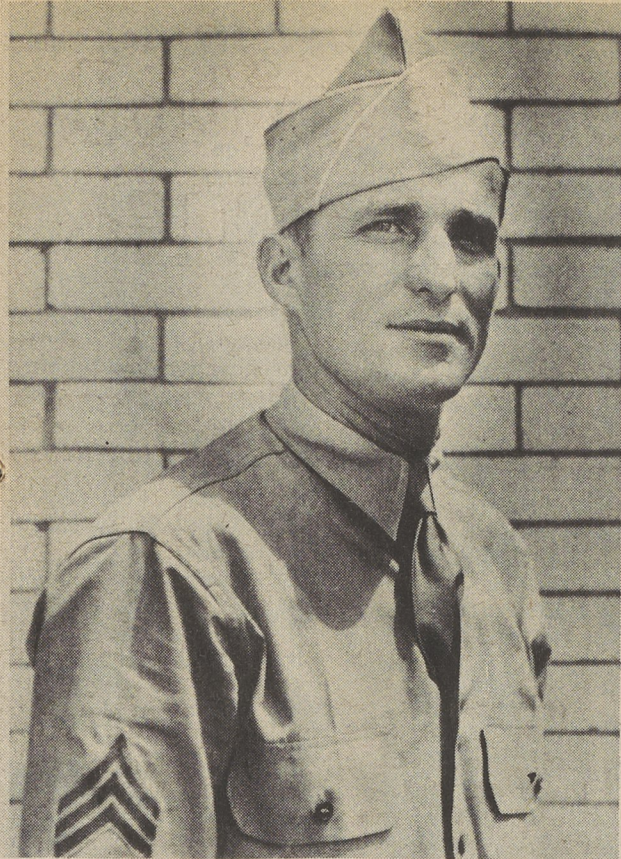
## Lake man charged with threats

## Back Mt. veterans receive belated Stars

Two World War II veterans from the Back Mountain were recently advised that they will receive awards of the Bronze Star medal for service during that conflict.

Paul (Sarge) Kutzer of Harveys Lake and Bob Hazletine of Jackson Township were among the holders of the Combat Infantryman's Badge during the period Dec. 7, 1941 to Sept. 2, 1945, who were advised by the Disabled American Veterans association that they were entitled to the medal.

Both Hazletine and Kutzer previously earned bronze Stars for their military performance during the war. Kutzer said both men also earned

Purple Heart and Silver Star awards from the Army.

An article in a DAV magazine said the belated awards were issued for meritorious achievement in ground operations against the enemy in the European Theatre of Operations during WWII.

Kutzer said he served in Europe under General George Patton with the Third Army Task Force Harris and with the 63rd "Blood and Fire" Infantry Division commanded by the Seventh Army's General Patch.

Kutzer is a retired businessman and is recuperating after his third stay at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Wilkes-Barre.

The U.M.Y.F. is also

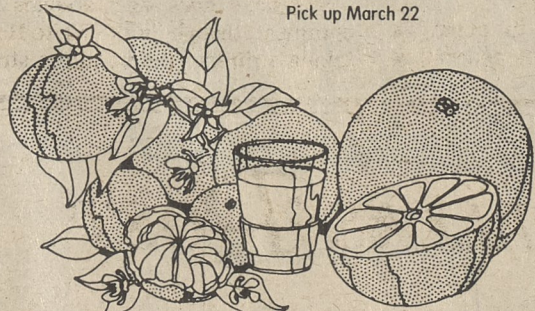

Dallas. An undisclosed sum of money was reported as having been taken from the home. County juvenile court has been petitioned for a hearing.

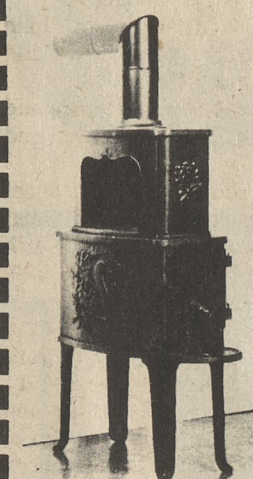
## 2 arrested in window breakage
