Bob Law promotes youth sportsmanship

Since 1950, Back Mountain Baseball has been promoting sportsmanship for area youths. This year, the fourth consecutive year, Robert Law of Dallas is serving as president of this organization.

Back Mountain Baseball is comprised of five different leagues. Boys from the ages of 13 through 15 play in the Teener's League. Girls softball is divided into two leagues. Girls from the ages of 10 through 12 play in the Girl's Softball League. Older girls between the ages of 13 and 15 play in the Back Mountain senior league softball. Boys who are between the ages of 9 and 12 play in either the farm league, minor league, or major league. Altogether there are 54 baseball teams in the Back Mountain.

Bob's job is to oversee the entire operation.

According to Bob, the various committees do a good job carrying out different projects. Boys in Little League participate in "door bell night", going from door to door collecting donations. This is the Little League's only financial endeavor. Last year, girls participating in girl's softball sold bags of peanuts to raise funds. Although he jokingly stated that he, "just tells everyone else what to do", Bob expends much time and effort for the kids.

Since 1962, Bob has been affiliated with Back Mountain when he began as an umpire. Since becoming president of the group, Bob does not umpire their games.

In addition to his work with Back Mountain Baseball, Bob is a member of the PIAA Umpires Association and also the Wyoming Valley Softball Umpire's

Association.

He is also involved in basketball, being a charter member of Back Mountain Basketball, which was initiated in 1975 by Joe O'Donnell.

He is also a member of the American Red Cross Three Gallon Club. Bob has served on the Dallas School District Citizens Advisory Committee and is a member of the Dallas Band Parents.

Bob, his wife Mary, and their three children live on Jackson Street in Dallas. The Law's oldest daughter, Nancy, is a student at Bloomsburg State College.
