






Mark, Jackson Township, Ceasetown, was awarded a Certificate of Achievement for successful completion of the 1977-78 program-Hiring Practices and Interview Techniques in Management Skill Development from the Department of Education -Executive Academy. This professional achievement is entered in the records of the Executive Academy and the certificate is awarded by the authority of the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

The hiring of key school, industry and government personnel is exceedingly important. The participants were instructed in developing policies of recruitment and hiring, procedures and strategies of interviewing prospective employes and the identification of individuals who have the potential for growth.
