## Dallas cycle notice

If you're thinking about riding a motorcycle or motorbike or any similar vehicle in Dallas Borough, Chief of Police Ed Lyons would like to remind you that there are certain rules to be followed and that his department will enforce them.

To operate a motorcycle or trail bike on the streets within the borough, you must have all applicable protective equipment. Your vehicle must be properly registered and you must be licensed.

A trail bike may be operated off the streets without the protective gear, registration, or license and without such equipment as turn signals and a muffler.

However, whether operating a motorcycle or trail bike within the borough, whether off-road, on trails, or on landed estates, riders are reminded that, although they are not required to have signals or protective gear, they are expected to be considerate of borough residents with respect to loud and unusual noises created by their machines.

The borough has specific ordinances pertaining to creation of nuisances and for the peace and good order of the residents.

Any person unlawfully making any loud, boisterous, or unseemly noise or annoying peaceable residents nearby on any public highway, road, street, lane, or park in the borough, whereby the public peace is broken or disturbed or the traveling public annoyed shall be guilty of disorderly conduct and will be prosecuted, says the law.

The laws apply to motorcycles, motor-driven cycles, and motorized pedicycles.

Riders of the new "mopeds" are required to have protective coverings for the eyes as well as valid state operators' licenses and registration plates.

## Three injured

Three people were treated at Nesbitt Hospital, Kingston, for injuries suffered in automobile accidents Sunday and Monday, Kingston Township Police report.

Discharged after treatment for injuries suffered when she was struck by a car while running across Manor Drive Sunday evening was Kris Butler, 16, of 172 Woodbine Rd., Shavertown.

According to Sgt. William Pugh, Butler was on the way down from the hilltop area when she ran across Manor Drive into the path of an oncoming car driven by Holly M. Mutahtler, 21, of 112 13th Ave., Bethlehem.

Butler was reportedly tossed up onto the hood and windshield of the car when Mutahtler was unable to stop in time and struck her.

A young man and woman were treated at Nesbitt for injuries suffered when the automobile in which they were riding along Route 309 early Monday morning left the road, striking a wall and a guardrail.

Injured were David W. Gramps, 19, of RD 3, Dallas, and Tammy Lutes, 17, 39 North Pioneer Ave., Shavertown.

According to Patrolmen Gary Beisel and Walter Davis, the 1976 Oldsmobile driven by Gramps was proceeding south along Route 309 near South Main St. when Gramps lost control.

The vehicle struck a bridge wall, bounced off and entered a washed-out section of the berm, and continued southward, leaving the road and striking the guardrail.

Injured were removed in the Kingston Township ambulance. The car was towed from the scene.

A Dallas man's car was towed from the scene late Friday evening following a rear-end collision on Route 309 near Hillside St.

Damaged were the olmen Gary Beisel and James Wisniewski, 1968 Dodge of Stanley P. Frania, 18, of Perrins Pond, RD 3, Dallas, and the 1973 Chevrolet of Denise A. Stolarich, 20, of RD 6, Reese St., Dallas.

According to Patrolmen Gary Beisel and James Wisniewski, Stolarich was proceeding north along Route 309 in the passing lane shortly before midnight Friday, when she slowed down, being struck from behind by the Frania vehicle.

## Camper found

Kingston Township Police are investigating the theft and recovery of a camper vehicle and the theft of a pistol, items taken in separate incidents.

Taken and recovered was a 1969 Ford pickup

with a a camper attachment. The vehicle was removed from its parking space in front of the home of its owner, P. Tobey Humphrey, 75 Meadowcrest St., Trucksville, overnight between Friday and Saturday after having been jumped.

The vehicle was recovered the next day along Coon Road. Investigating is Ptlm. Luther Rozelle.

Still missing is a 22 caliber Ruger pistol, taken from the home of Charles H. Smith, RD 3, Wyoming.

Smith told Sgt. William Pugh and Ptlm. John Appel that he discovered the pistol missing Thursday, having last seen it late in April or early in May.

The driver, a 17-year-old Shavertown male, was also charged with operating a motor vehicle after midnight with a junior license.

Charged also were James Malarkey, 18, of 805 West 8th St., Wyoming, and Karen S. Laver, 18, of 99 Warden Ave., Trucksville. A Trucksville male youth with no age indicated was similarly charged.

A fifth passenger in the car was freed when it was ascertained by police that she had not been drinking.

According to police, Sgt. William Pugh spotted two vehicles on Grove St., Trucksville, in the early morning hours and pursued them along Route 309 heading north, calling for the other patrol to assist.

The two cars reportedly turned into East Center St. and then into North Main St., with Ptlm. Walter Davis capturing the first and Sgt. Pugh the second. All arrests were made among occupants of the first car.

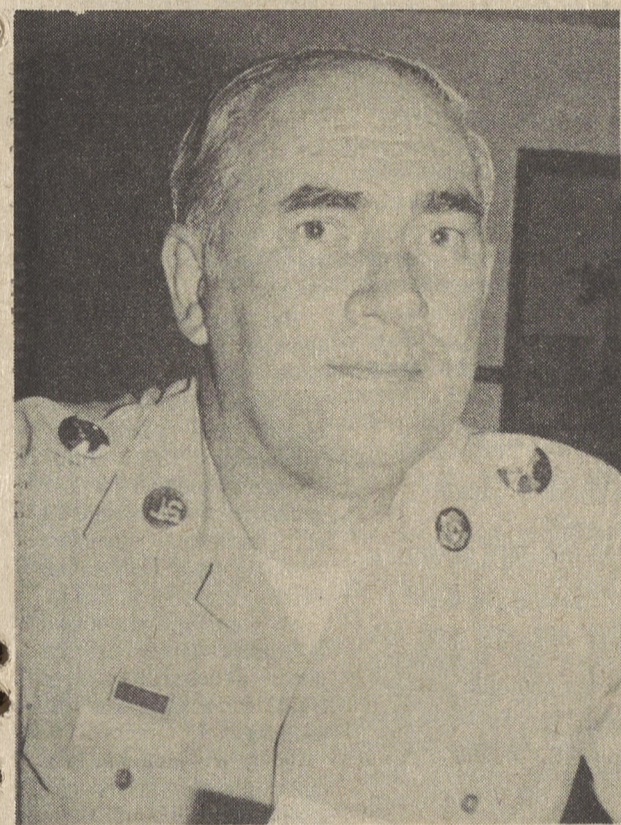

## Trucksville resident area's top enlisted man

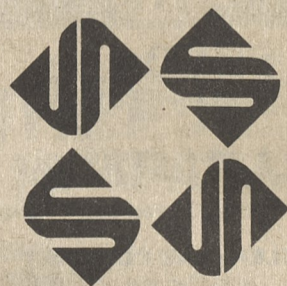

Franklin lives on Pioneer Avenue, Trucksville, with his wife Regina and daughter Jeanmarie. A son Robert is on active duty in the Army.

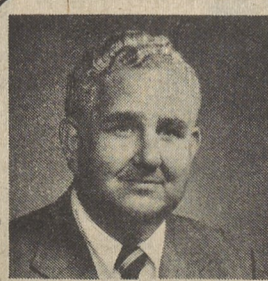

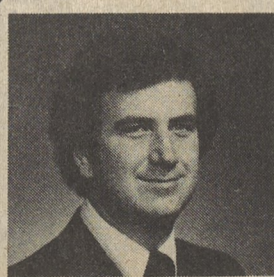

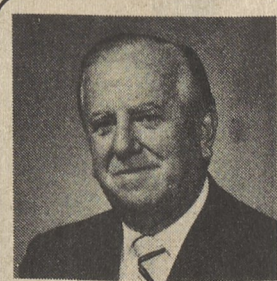
