Mountain**

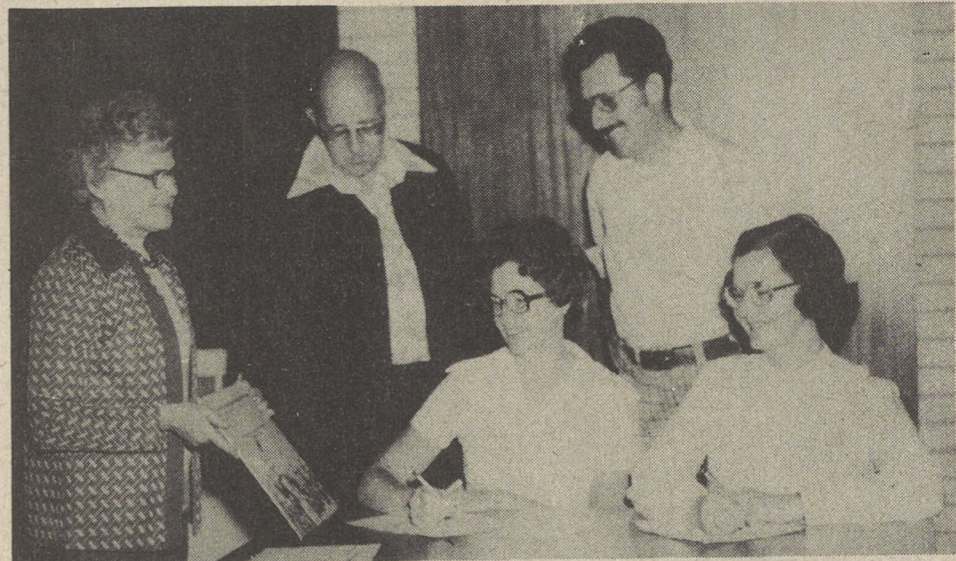
The Penna. 76'ers Chapter 29, Good Sam Club held their August campout over the past weekend at Stony Mountain Campground in Tunkhannock.
