system, construction and installation of shelving and cabinets, installation of paneling and vinyl-coated sheet rock.

Senior high work at the senior high consisted of restoration of canopy in front of building, painting exterior, roof work, gym seating repairs, etc. As an energy conservation measure, the boys' locker room ceiling is being converted from block ceiling to sheet rock ceiling with metal frame.

Further assistance was provided at the senior high by CETA employees in preparing gym floors and other areas of the building for the opening of school, flushing out and covering electrical access area behind school, maintaining of football field, minor repairs on mowers, water pressure problems. Assistance was also given in the removal of brush, debris, dead trees, weeds, etc. in conjunction with work being done by Marines on proposed athletic field. Additional work at the senior high consisted of repair and painting of exterior doors, planting and maintaining flower beds, and installation of drainage system for practice field.

Westmoreland Elementary - major work was accomplished to bring this school up to standards set by Act 504 (Barrier Free Buildings For The Handicapped).

District-wide - throughout the school year, weatherizing and painting in all areas of the school district are on-going, which result in a cost savings of thousands of dollars to the district, and a highly improved general appearance of district buildings.

The primary concern of the custodial staff over the summer months has been the performance of preventive maintenance on building equipment in conjunction with extensive cleaning, disinfecting, painting, and preparation of the school buildings in anticipation of the students return on Aug. 29.

The supervisory personnel of the maintenance department have been scheduling and coordinating the projects outlined above, expediting supply materials, preparing future work schedules, training programs and insuring building preparedness for the first day of the new school year.
