6th grade studies superstitions

Members of John Doerfler's sixth grade science classes recently completed a science unit about the differences between science and superstition.

Aspects of superstition over the years were examined in the light of how they relate to some of the more prevalent present-day superstitions.

The students conducted experiments to see whether supposedly lucky

pieces and charms actually did possess supernatural powers.

The experiments consisted of students tallying instances of good and bad luck while possessing the "lucky" charms, then of

tallying results of good and bad luck while not possessing the charms.

The results showed that in both cases, the students had, or least recognized "good luck" at a ratio of about 4 to 3.

Real Estate exams

Persons holding four credits in real estate who plan to take the State Real

Estate Examination in November are advised to enroll in the Real Estate Crash Course at Luzerne County Community College, Scheduled for Oct. 28 and Nov. 4, at the main campus in Nanticoke.

The course is designed to instruct persons in preparation for the state examination, and includes Brokers License Act, Real Estate and Business Mathematics, Rules and Regulations of Real Estate Commission, Definitions of Real Estate terminology, testing and testing procedures.

To become eligible for the course, persons must have earned four credits, have a sponsoring broker (required for the state exam), and have already submitted an application for the examination.

The sessions will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on two consecutive Saturdays, Oct. 28 and Nov. 4. Instructors will be William Combroski and Joseph J. Rosen, licensed real estate brokers.
