After stressing the importance of attitude in problem solving, Dombroski breaks down the problem solving process into five phases; information gathering, ideation or the idea-flow stage and overall creative affluence, evaluation, decision making, and implementation.

## King's sets 1979 goal


The \$250,000 goal of the "1979 Campaign for King's" will be used by King's College for student financial aid and to develop academic programs.


Dr. Buzinkai's course will be Problems in Political Theory: Psychology and Politics. It will deal with the application of psychological insights into such phenomena as leadership,

The airman is a 1975 graduate of Lake-Lehman High School, Lehman.




