Lake-Lehman Football Mothers will hold their regular monthly meeting Monday, March 12, at 8 p.m. at the high school.

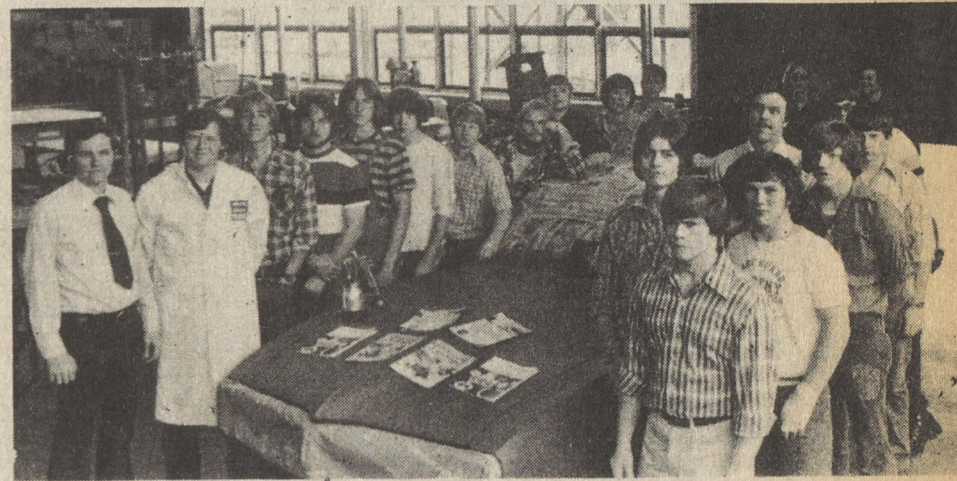
All junior and senior high school football mothers are urged to attend.

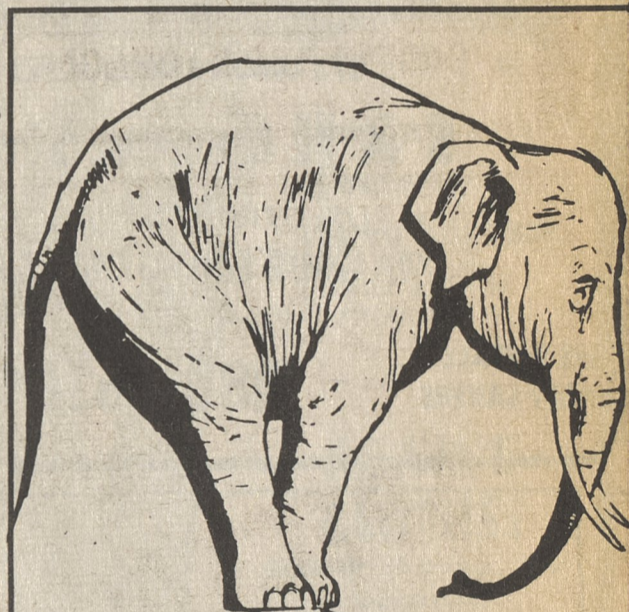
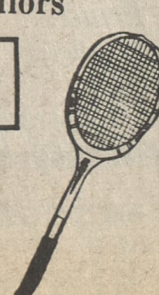
