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# Trinity UP breaks ground for Christian ed building

What's more, the prisoners who conduct the "Scared Straight" program are actually giving up privileges to do it. Taking time to yell at the boys and make them see what they may be headed for means that they can't do the jobs around the prison that provide them with spending money.

"They're making a great personal "Sacrifice," he notes. "Besides that, 'the program is financed entirely by the prisoners themselves and contributors with no help from the penal system.'

Cast believes that the Rahway experience is a valuable adjunct to his wwn efforts at St. Michael's. "I'm an educator in the art of living," he says of his work at the school. "I supervise all aspects of the boys lives from the relate to the kids." time school ends until bedtime. But what I'm basically trying to do is to visit actually helps the St. Michael's cram as much discipline as possible boys, Cast offers the example of one "into their lives."

That discipline, in his view, is precisely what his charges need most. Many come from disorganized home situations or have let the temptation of momentary thrills get them into trouble

But Rahway helps Cast show them that they'd better work with him and learn to shape up, for, if they enter prison, "There's no guarantee they'll get out alive."

Originally from Queens, N.Y., Cast went through the Pinecrest Bible College, intending to become a minister, and came to Harding to work for a church. But his involvement with St. Michael's led to his present life's work instead.

"I come from a background of hard knocks," he explains, "and so I can

"leader" who underwent a complete turnaround after the trip.

"A prisoner took the boy offstage for about five minutes, and I don't know exactly what happened there. Afterward he wouldn't talk about it, but it was definitely a turning point in his life.

"From then on he took up four or five charges (school jobs done for pay) and became a completely different person."

Typical comments from his group, he says, were such as "I'm not going there" or "I'm going straight."

St. Michael's now maintains a continuing participation in the Rahway program, with another trip planned for the near future. Cast says he'd be glad to return, but he feels it's important to let the other counselors have the chance to take their own groups and find out for themselves how "Scared Straight" works.
