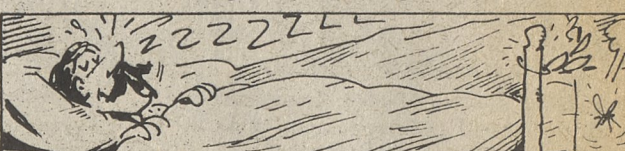

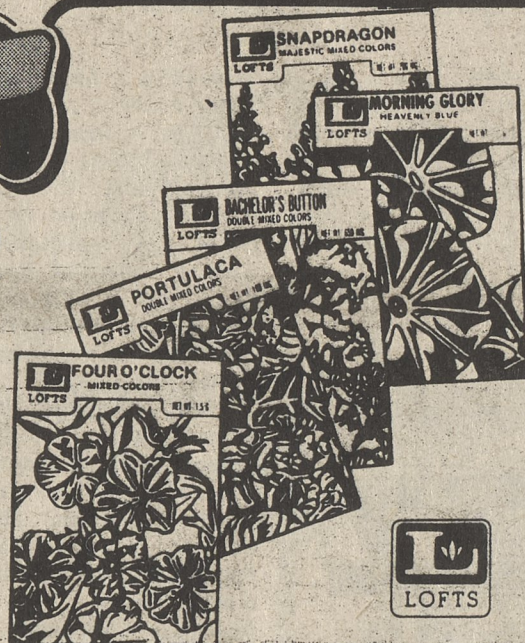

Chet's personal motto in life is "Keep Moving", and it shows in her impressive style and in her cheerful and energetic personality. The public is invited to see

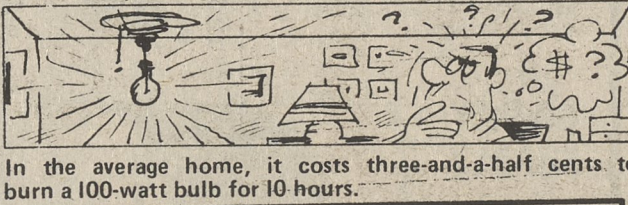
