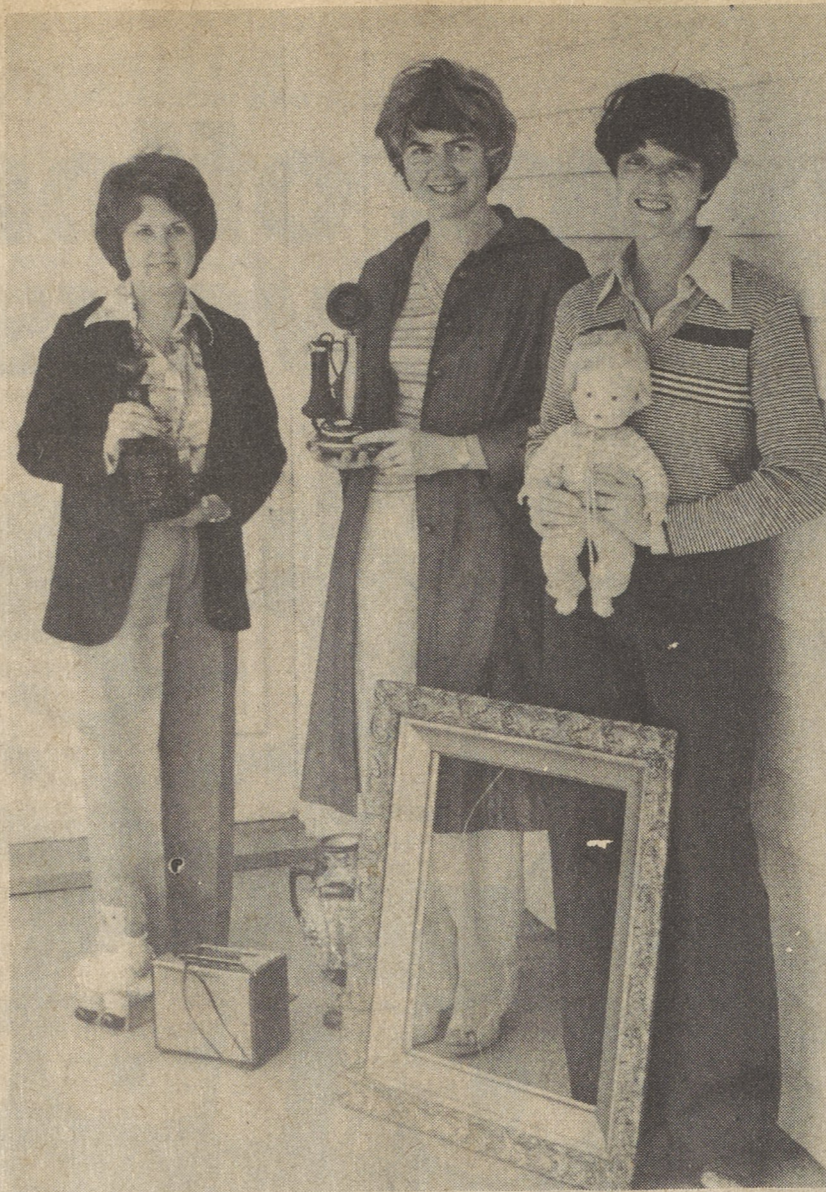
furniture will not be acceptable.

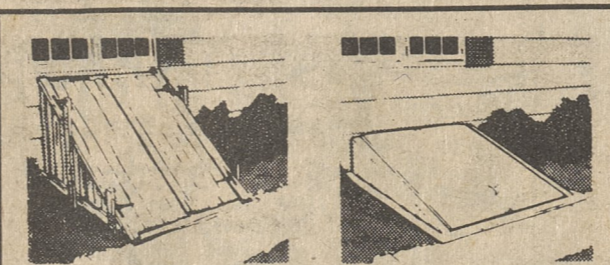
The spring program will conclude with a performance at The Folk Arts Festival on June 2, at 6:30 p.m. at College Misericordia.
