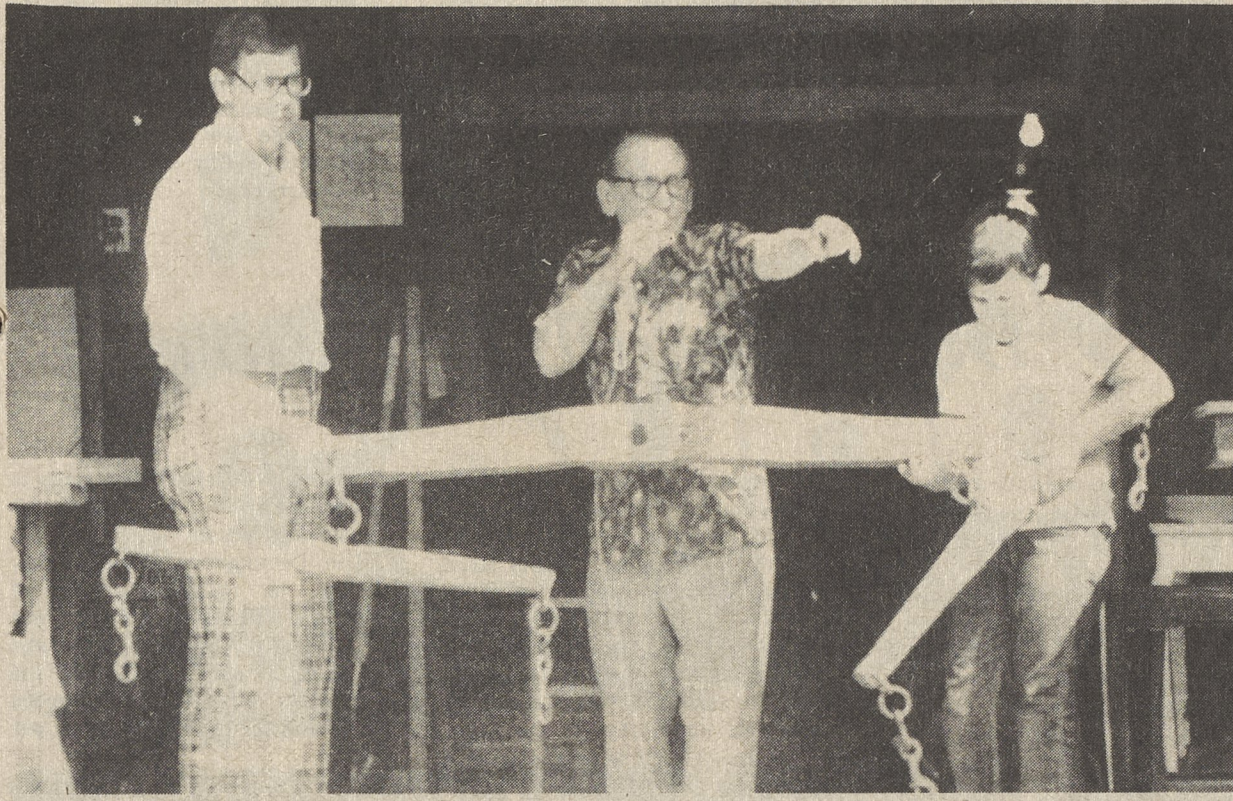

HL planners split 3-2 to allow use

By a 3-2 margin, the Harveys Lake Planning Commission voted to recommend to the borough zoning hearing board a "special exception" for a family desiring to use as a two-family dwelling a building in an R1A (single-family) zone.

Granted was the petition of Melvin, Jacqueline, and Richard Myers to make use of the building on a 12-acre plot of land owned by the family.

After more than an hour of debate sometimes taking the form of harsh language, board member Francis Kopko moved to make the recommendation. Robert Wintersteen and Richard Heuer voted to support Kopko's motion, while Mike Wood and Tony Fulton voted "no."

Dr. M. I. Slavin voluntarily surrendered chairmanship of the commission to Heuer for the duration of the Myers argument, citing his personal interest in the case, and did not vote. He functioned instead as a witness, strongly maintaining that the petition should be denied.

The request was part of a two-pronged attempt by the Myers family to ensure legal use of the building. The Luzerne County Court En Banc has slated a hearing on the question of whether or not the property qualifies for two-family occupancy as a matter of "prior use."

The Court En Banc will be considering the case on the basis of an appeal filed after the Common Pleas Court Judge Robert Hourigan ruled that such prior use had not

demonstrably existed.

Slavin contended that the zoning area was single-family R1A, that the zoning ordinance permitted special exceptions there in terms of division of plots of land only, and that no court action had upheld any prior use claim that could overrule present zoning restrictions.

Melvin and Richard Myers argued that the property was a legitimate nonconforming use, producing statements from a borough zoning officer which they said attested to their claim. They said that they had been renting an apartment in the property to students for years and had put a great deal of money into it. Their desire to make it permanently two sets of living quarters, in their view, was a continuing use and nothing new.

The contending parties exchanged harsh words at times as they went over the history of the problem.

Slavin produced a list of signatures which he said he had gathered from the Myers' neighbors protesting the proposed use of the building. The only neighbors not signing, he said, were those who employed members of the Myers family for various jobs.

Melvin and Richard Myers responded that Slavin had exaggerated and misrepresented their case to the neighbors and that the Common Pleas Court case had been lost because the Zoning Hearing Board had submitted only "selective" information.

When Slavin claimed that the

Myers family had threatened a neighbor for opposing them in court, Melvin Myers shouted "That's a lie" and accused Slavin of "inflating" and "clouding" the issue.

In other business commission secretary Ann Marie Shaver was directed to contact three architectural and engineering firms to draw up "rough plans" and give cost estimates for beautifying the Sunset area. The firms are Smith, Miller Associates; Bohlen and Powell; and an unidentified Allentown firm that board member Tony Fulton said he sometimes works with.

The board agreed that, since the Pennsylvania Department of Community Affairs had recommended architects who know the area for the job, Fulton (a Harveys Lake architect) should not be ruled out simply because he serves on the commission.

Commission members also agreed to seek individually knowledgeable professionals who might be able to help the borough rewrite the zoning ordinance which Slavin called a "very bad" ordinance that "breeds court cases." Shaver was instructed to inquire into possible grants for paying for the assistance.

Shaver was also told to notify borough council that a prior subdivision of a property owned by Helen Sgarlat in the Sandy Beach area was technically not in conformity with borough regulations but that the commission allowed it when "new to the job" and could not issue a new ruling now.

The decision by the members came as the result of questions from the floor about how much the proposed addition and increased parking area would cost and what if any means could be developed for coping with the strong odor of sewage entering the building.

The Taxpayers Association has long advocated putting borough offices in the authority building as an alternative to the borough
