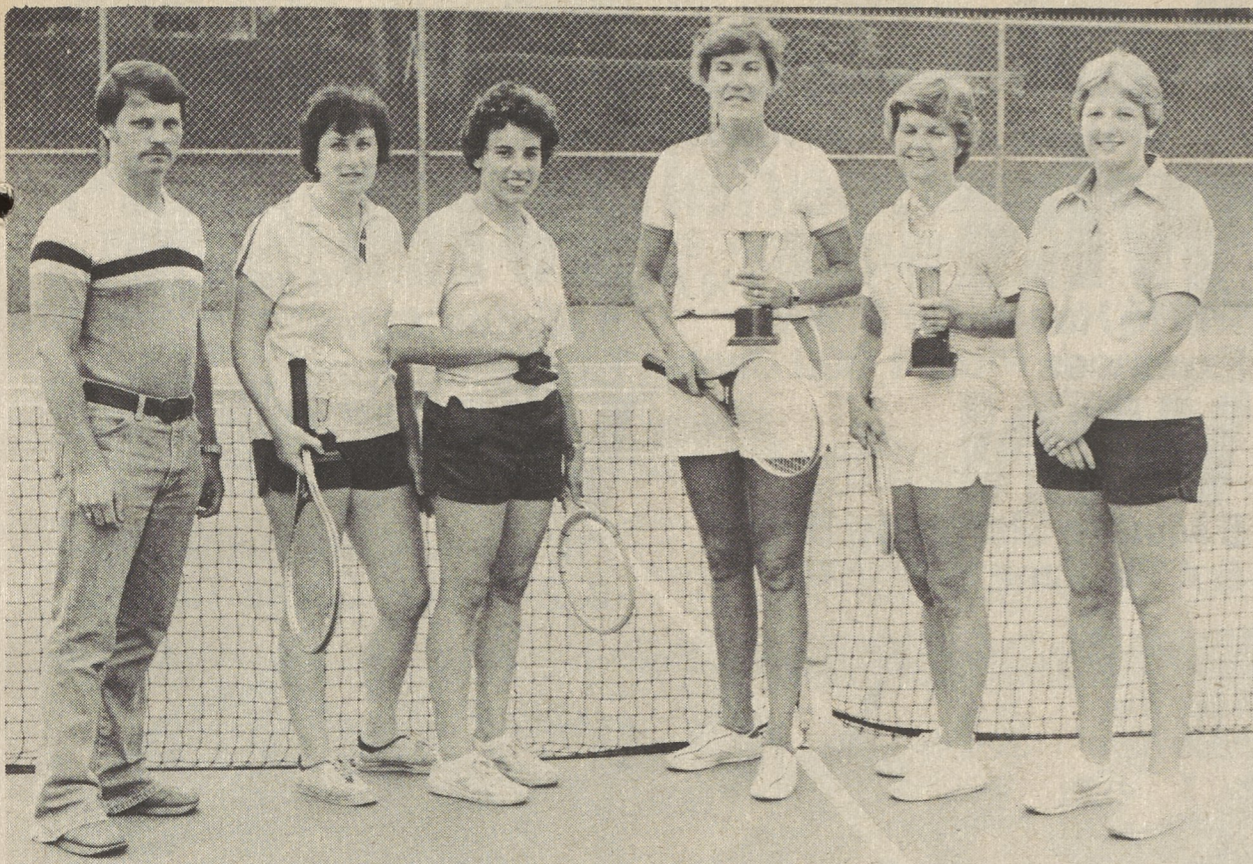


Local women win in Tupper Cup finals

In addition all entries received a Tupper Cup tournament T-shirt and a three month subscription to the Dallas Post.

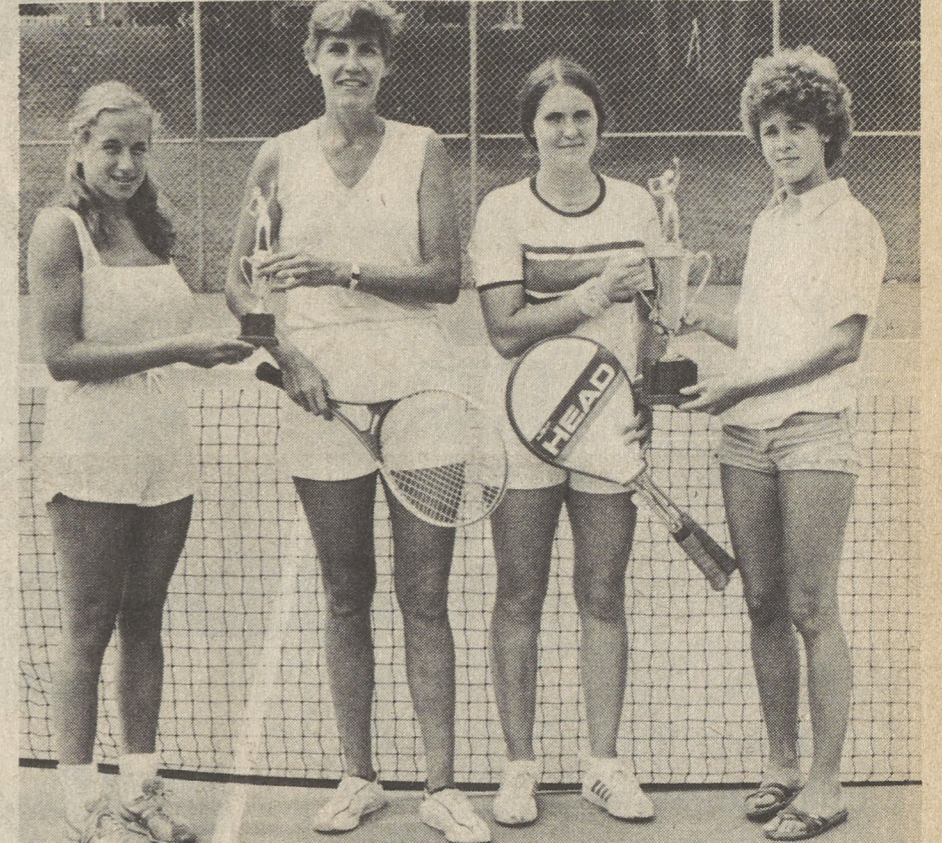

Season ends this week in Slo-Pitch

Final frame of regular season games will be played Thursday evening by teams of the American and National Divisions of the Back Mountain Slo-Pitch Softball League.

Postseason playoff games are scheduled to get underway on Tuesday. Plans for the postseason playoffs were completed at a meeting of league officials and representatives of the eight teams—first four teams in both divisions—at a meeting last night (Wednesday) at Barbacci's Lunch in Noxen.

Harveys Lake will have three teams from that area among the eight in the postseason playoffs, including Villa Roma in the National Division and Grotto Pizza and Hilltop Inn in the American Division.

Every other area with teams in the league will be represented in the playoffs with Cook's from Lehman, Pizza Bar from Shavertown, Columbia Porch Shades from Idetown, Tupper's from Dallas and the Rebels from Noxen.

In the American Division, Noxen Rebels had captured first place and straight season honors. The Rebels had compiled a record of 16 wins and a loss going into the final week of play.

Grotto Pizza, in second place in the American Division, had a 13-5 record.

Hilltop Inn of Harveys Lake with a mark of 11-6 and Tupper's with a record of 11-7 were the other teams. At the beginning of the final week of play were listed in that order in the league standing. It was possible that some change could take place during this week's games that would affect the standings and result in a change of opponents for the playoffs.

Cook's Owls of Lehman won honors in the National Division. The team had a 17-1 record going into the final week of play. Villa Roma was in second place with an 11-5 mark while Pizza Bar and Columbia Porch Shades with records of 10-7 and 9-7 respectively could finish in a different order depending on results of this week's games.

League officials at the beginning of the week

talked about the order of opponents for the playoffs. One league official stated that the No. 1 team after the end of the regular season this evening would meet the team that finished in the No. 4 spot, and teams finishing in the No. 2 and No. 3 spots would face each other in the playoffs. That matter was one of the major items on last night's agenda.

This evening's games will send the Rebels against Noxen Texaco at 6 and Cook's of Lehman against Villa Roma at 7 on the Noxen diamond in what some observers term the best attraction of the season. Rebels and Noxen Texaco will stage an intra-town 'prestige' battle, while Villa Roma will be sampling its prowess against Cook's, the National Division straight season winners.

In other games this evening, Grotto Pizza and Hilltop meet each other at 6 on the back field at Lehman. The teams ranked No. 2 and No. 3 in the American Division going into the final week of straight season play and will undoubtedly face each other in the semi-finals of the division playoffs. Miller's will play Down Home Muic at 7 on the back diamond at Lehman.

On the front diamond at Lehman, Treat Drive-Inn will host the Whips and Columbia Porch Shades will meet the third place Pizza Bar.

The games between Pizza Bar and Columbia Porch Shades will decide No. 3 and No. 4 spots in the National Division and there will be considerable effort exerted for a win by both teams. Riding on the outcome of the game will be the answer to the question of which team will meet first place

Cook's in the semi-finals for the National Division postseason championship.

Tupper's Sporting Goods in the American Division and Mr. Donut in the National have the byes for this evening.

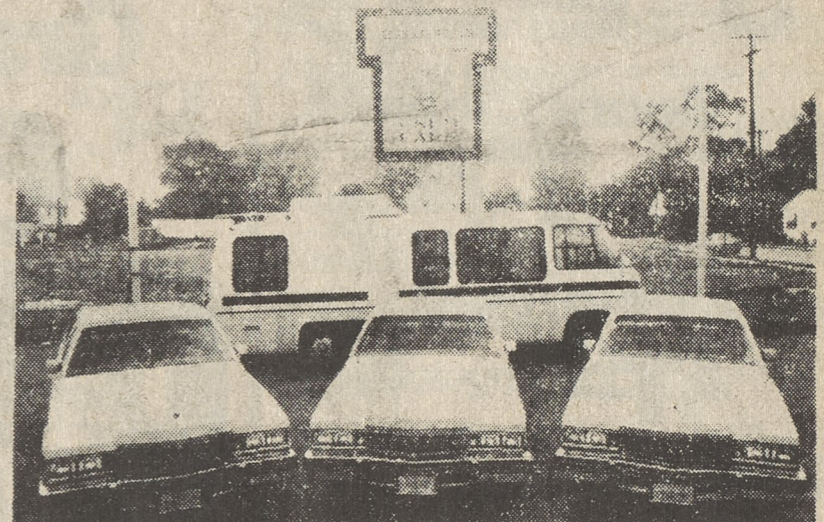
