

per year for the new facility which, at current assessed valuation, would be approximately seven mills of taxes. That figure will be reduced even further as the assessed valuation of the district increases. Original "guesstimates" placed

the cost of the facility as high as 4.3 million dollars with an increase in real estate millage as high at 15.

Final contractor bid figures, however, indicated significant savings of close to \$800,000 over original cost projections--and these figures will result in significant savings for taxpayers.

Gilbert Tough, president of the board of school directors, commented on the new school, "We, of the board of school directors, are very pleased with the final cost figure on this new building. Lake-Lehman has always been very conservative and the bid figures prove conclusively that this is a conservative building.

"There are no Taj Mahjal features such as olympic-size swimming pools, TV studios or

outreageous experimental facilities. This is a school very similar to our Lehman-Jackson building, designed to provide students and teachers with a pleasant learning environment and no frills to burden taxpayers.

"I want to commend my fellow board members for the many hours they have spent in bringing this building to the point where we are now ready for ground breaking.

"We are also very pleased that we were able to constantly respond to the local taxpayers and keep the building costs far below what the state "Taj Mahal Bill" indicates we might have paid for this facility."
