Reckless driving

Allunis gets lawyer

Paul P. "Frenchy" Allunis, awaiting trial on drug and assault charges, was assigned a court-appointed lawyer last week.

Luzerne County Public Defender Michael Cefalo has been assigned by Luzerne County Judge Robert Hourigan to represent Allunis. Presently lodged in the county prison, Allunis is scheduled for trial next week on charges of possession and delivery of a controlled substance.

No date has yet been set for his trial on charges of aggravated assault and reckless endangerment in connection with the May shooting of Harveys Lake "adult bookstore" owner Allen Morrow.

Allunis had earlier requested a Public Defender but had been turned down for financial reasons. Judge Hourigan said that more recent investigation of Allunis' financial circumstances made it possible to assign Cefalo.

Apology required

Two Kingston boys were reprimanded and made to apologize after arrest by Kingston Township Police in connection with the removal of a box-making tool from the property of a Shavertown resident last Thursday.

A resident of the Peter Kerpovich home, RD 7, Box 399, reported having seen the two boys remove the tool. Police then discovered the tool some distance from the property and picked up the two boys, one of whom admitted to having taken it. Their parents were called and witnessed the reprimand and apology.

Harassment complaint

A "harassment" complaint by a Chase Correctional Institution inmate against two other inmates will be the

subject of a hearing before District Magistrate Leonard Harvey Wednesday.

Inmate Michael Wilson has made the charges against fellow inmates Alonzo Gadden and Harold Dixon, contending that they used physical violence against him at the prison. Wilson signed the complaint in Magistrate Harvey's office Tuesday morning.

Mt. Zion to consider plans for fire house

Initial Fall meeting of Mt. Zion Bicentennial Fire Company will be held Tuesday evening at 8 at the fire hall on Mt. Zion road. Members are asked to note the permanent change of meeting time from the second Wednesday of each month to the first Tuesday.

Main topic on the agenda for Tuesday night's session will be plans for continuing work on the new firehouse, which is under construction by members. So far work has been completed on the outside frame; floor has been cemented; the building is under-roof and insulated, and heat is in. One bathroom also has been completed.

Additional work required includes the finishing of the inside walls, installation of a suspended ceiling and work on a second lavatory room.

The new building, a project of the bicentennial year celebration in the Mt. Zion area, was constructed of cinder blocks, and has three bays and a meeting room with a good sized basement. The building measures 40 by 60 feet. The Mt. Zion Fire Company has a 1956 Ford pumper fire truck and a 1966 GMC tanker with a 1,500 gallon capacity.

The Mt. Zion Fire Company has been active in community and civic celebrations since its beginning. This summer the fire company's men and equipment have taken part in about 10 firemen's parades in-

cluding those at Pittston, Pittston Township, Franklin Township, Back Mountain, West Wyoming, Exeter, Exeter Park, West Pittston and
