His best event is the 440. Tommy won that event in the Junior Olympics meet at Meyers High school and went on to the State Junior Olympics competition where he placed sixth.

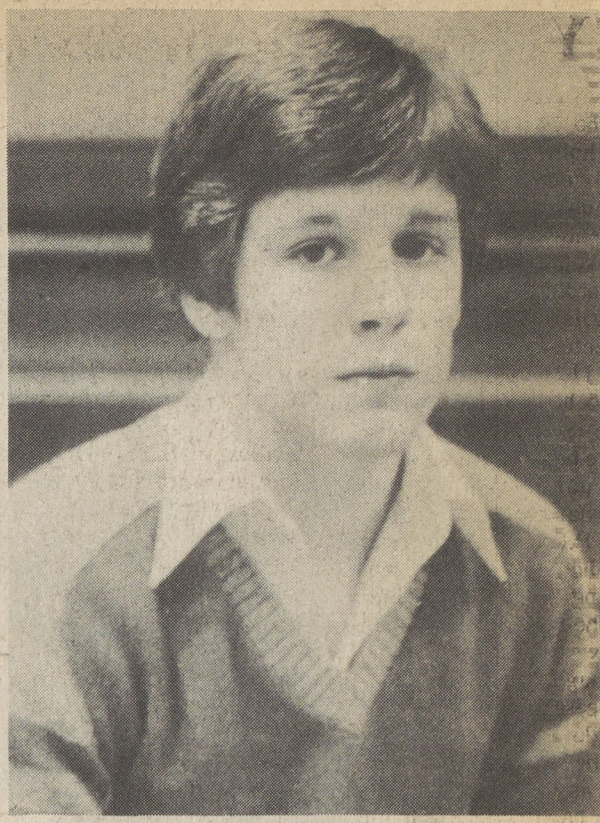

7th grade 'adapt's societies

Seventh Grade History students of William Roberts at the Dallas Junior High School experienced an interaction unit exploring the importance of physical environment to past, present, and future societies in Project ADAPT.

Students were encouraged to become intellectually and emotionally involved in the study of physical geography, anthropology, and world geography in small group research on the effects of physical environment on the culture of various societies.

Each group studied the climate zones, vegetation zones, landforms, wildlife, and minerals in relation to the human capacity to overcome the problems found in vastly different physical environments.

Specific activities included the reading and interpreting of maps dealing with specific geographic data, the correlation of data from various physical maps, the application of data from reference sources, the preparation and presentation of group conclusions to the other students, and finally the evaluation of the work of fellow students in other groups.

Project ADAPT is a part of the new and expanding action curriculum under development at the Dallas Junior High School.

Dallas Twp. School News

While most of us were centering our attention on the sights and sounds of Christmas in the busy days preceding the holidays the sixth grade Title I students were busy exploring the murky depths of Loch Ness searching for the "monster" and speculating over its existence via the Crestwood Read-A-Long Book. New vocabulary words were introduced and practiced through vocabulary bingo and concentration.

The fifth graders concentrated on long and short vowel sounds and spelling patterns with a wide variety of phonics games. New vocabulary words were added as students enjoyed a book and filmstrip about hummingbirds.

Using the aviation theme, third and fourth graders learned new vocabulary words in a unit about "Lucky Lindy" and follow up work in a book about the Wright Brothers. To reinforce the new vocabulary words students played Reading Roadway. "Superguy" was introduced to the second graders. This filmstrip character helped them to learn to sound out words. Phonics work books and the Dolch Sound Game were used to practice the techniques introduced in the film.

The students also played "name and claim" and Reading Roadway to practice the Singer 55 basic nouns and Singer 90 basic easy sight words.

As we approached the new year, the second and third grade Title I classes worked on a unit of Time (telling time and learning about the calendar.) The students made owl clocks. The boys and girls also used a clock stamp and filled in the clock hands, hour and half hour. The names of the days and the months were also emphasized and second and third graders made a calendar for the month.

The fourth grade worked with the Quiz Kid Racer, a self-correcting math calculator. Students went from amateur to complex in addition, subtraction and multiplication. They also reviewed the calendar and telling time.
