After beating batter well, reserve 1 1/2 cups in a separate bowl, combining 1/4 cup of chocolate syrup with this batter. Alternately spoon batters into a bundt pan. person who doesn't like chocolate cake. A favorite at the Mill's house is Carol's Dark Chocolate Cake. The secret ingredient in this dark, moist, rich cake is a cup of strong boiling coffee added to the cake batter. Frost Dark Chocolate Cake with your favorite icing or sprinle with powered sugar.

BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES
16 c. sliced cucumbers
4 lg. onions
3 c. sugar
4 t. salt
4 t. mustard seed
3 c. vinegar
3 c. water
1 t. tumeric

Boil sugar, vinegar, water and spices together. Add cucumbers and onions. Cook until cucumbers and onions start turning yellow. Pack in jars and seal. Makes 4 quarts.

ZUCCHINI BREAD
3 eggs
1 c. oil
1 1/2 c. sugar
2 c. grated zucchini
2 t. vanilla
2 c. flour
1/4 t. baking powder
2 t. baking soda
3 t. cinnamon
1 t. salt

1 c. raisins
1 c. walnuts, chopped
2 c. sugar
2 c. sifted flour
3/4 c. cocoa
2 eggs, beaten
1/2 c. salad oil
1 c. milk
2 t. baking soda
1 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt
1/2 t. vanilla

PISTACHIO MARBLE CAKE
1 pkg. yellow cake mix
1 3-oz. pkg. pistachio instant pudding.
1 c. strong boiling coffee
Mix all ingredients together thoroughly. Add boiling coffee. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes in a 9x13 baking pan.

4 eggs
1 c. water
1/2 c. oil
1/2 t. almond extract
1/4 c. chocolate syrup
Combine cake mix, pudding, eggs, water, oil and extract in bowl. Blend then beat 2 minutes. Measure out 1 1/2 cups of batter into a bowl. Stir chocolate syrup into the 1 1/2 cups batter. Spoon batters alternately into greased, floured 10" bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minute.

DARK CHOCOLATE CAKE
2 c. sugar
2 c. sifted flour
3/4 c. cocoa
2 eggs, beaten
1/2 c. salad oil
1 c. milk
2 t. baking soda
1 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt
1/2 t. vanilla

1 c. strong boiling coffee
Mix all ingredients together thoroughly. Add boiling coffee. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes in a 9x13 baking pan.
