DIVISION I

The Tornados, Timbers, and Chiefs continued their winning ways in the next to last week of Division I action, but two earlier games were cancelled because of a wet field.

The Tornados dominated a strong Roughneck team 3-0 as three different players scored. Mike Bailey, Kenny Klimovitz, and Steve Sennett scored with Richie Hoyes assisting Sennett. Fullback Nancy Niedzwiecki and goalie Jason Aben led the Tornados defense. Kevin Dick led the attack for the Roughnecks, and Jennifer Hoover excelled at fullback.

The Timbers dumped the Cosmos 3-1 on the strength of goals by Steve Gregor, Mike DePolo, and Brett Gauntlett. Mark Bigus assisted Gregor. Knights cross country runners to compete in states

Lake-Lehman's boys cross country team will compete in the state competition Nov. 7 at Penn State University by placing second in District 2 competition last Thursday.

The Knights placed second to Meyers, five-time defending District 2 Class AA boys and girls champion, in the compe-

tion held at Frances Slocum State Park.

Coached by Ed Narkiewicz, the Knights program is only five years old and is the first Back Mountain cross country team to qualify. The top two teams qualified to advance to the state tournament while only the top teams in the other divisions advance.

Lake-Lehman's Linda Glogowski took first in the girls division turning in a time of 18:10 and for the third time will compete in the state tournament.

Meyers defeated Lake-Lehman 45-55 to come in first but the Knights gave the Mohawks a tough challenge. Mohawk Mark Merlie finished first but Knights John Wendell finished fourth and Giro

Hall finished seventh, passing out two Meyers runners. Rich Cundiff and Mike Bernick also beat out Meyers runners but the Knights fifth runner, Terry Knorr finished 21st. Until that point, Lake-Lehman had it won.

The entire Back Mountain is proud of the young athletes, who will represent the local area on Nov. 7.

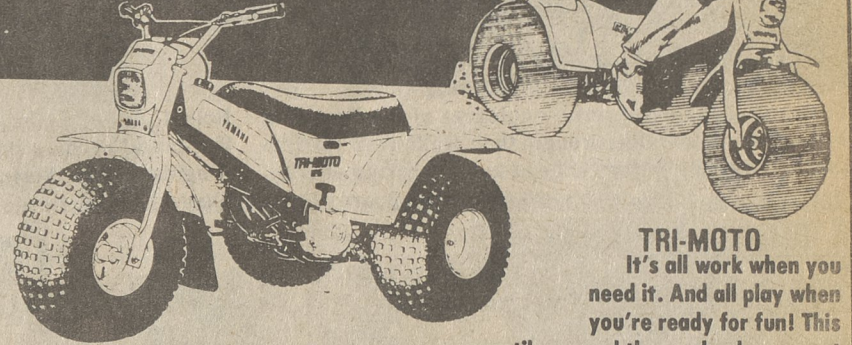
In the second round flick-off, Boudreaux scored a goal and Christi Strauser scored a second one to give Dallas the win.

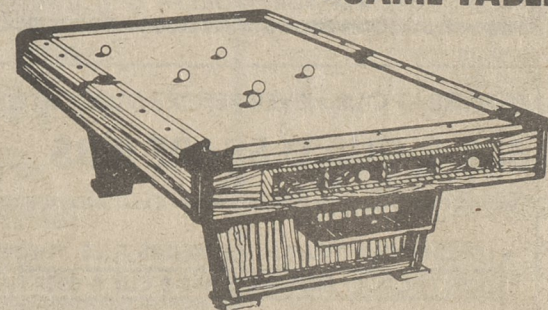
