

Sodrosky, Jr. at Shippensburg, brother at Temple

Keep a weather eye open on the fortunes of the Shippensburg State College grid team where Vince Sodrosky, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Vince Sodrosky, Sr. of Demunds Road, Dallas Township, is

a tight end. Vince, a senior at Shippensburg this school year is pursuing a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering. He was varsity fullback on the 1978-79 Dallas Area High grid team, which

had an 8-3 year in ex-Coach Jack Jones' last year at the helm of Dallas Area grid coaching. Shippensburg has a record of nine wins and no losses to date. The team was rated in the Number Nine Spot in College

Division Two, nationwide, prior to last Saturday, when the shippers knocked off highly touted Slippery State College at Shippensburg, 26 to 21. Shippensburg has knocked off these opponents in this season: Bloomsburg 38-17; Towson State of Maryland, 24-10; Indiana of Pennsylvania, 26-3; Edinboro 17-0; Clarion State 28-0; Lock Haven State, 24-20; C.W. Post, 49-35; California State (Penna.) 20-16, and Saturday's win against Slippery Rock.

Shippensburg plays its next game Saturday against James Madison of Maryland, then meets Millersville State College at Millersville on November 21. The Shippers are champions of the state Division Two Western Conference, and Millersville currently rates the Number One

Spot in the Eastern Conference, so that the November 21 fracas at Millersville looms as big as the upcoming battle between the University of Pittsburgh Panthers and Joe Paterno's Nittany Lions.

Sodrosky, who stands six feet and tips the scales at around 210, suffered a dislocated right elbow in Shippensburg's opening game against Bloomsburg and missed three games but is fully recovered.

His brother, Jeff, a freshman at Temple University in Philadelphia where he is pursuing studies for a physical ed degree, has not seen action with the Owls' junior varsity, having been 'red-shirted' back in September. He hopes to get back into action with Temple gridgers come Spring training. Jeff also played

on the Dallas Area eleven while at high school.

Meanwhile down at State College, the Leskowsky brothers, Ray and Mike, of Pikes Creek, are having a whale of a time as members of the Nittany Lions Jayvee squad. The Penn State Jayvee squad, which plays its games on Friday, has lost only once in seven outings this season. The lone loss came at the hands of the University of West Virginia Jayvees.

Both Leskowsky boys starred at Lake-Lehman during their high school grid days. Mike leading the Black Knights to a successful season last year. Ray, a freshman in the business administration course at Penn State, graduated from Lake-Lehman in '79. He earned an associate degree at Luzerne County Community College, and in September transferred to the main campus at State College. Ray tips the scales at 225, is 5'11" and a linebacker on the Jayvee Eleven. Mike, a bit heavier at 240 and taller at 6'2", graduated from Lake-Lehman in June, and is nose guard on the Nittany Lions junior varsity.

Another compensation for the two Leskowsky brothers - they're getting to see all of Nittany Lions varsity grid games this season along with, of course, Mom and Pop, and sometimes with Brother Tom and their Big Sister!

December.



Rybak pleased with Dallas

"I was pleased with the way the kids played. They gave as much as they could but what I feared might happen did," said Dallas Coach Ron Rybak after his Mountaineers 16-0 loss to Coughlin last Friday night.

"The field was muddy and as I said before we have no outside speed. That stopped us. We don't have the outside speed to run as well. Coughlin was quicker than we were on the outside.

"Every time we got the ball we were on our 10 yard line and we don't have too many plays for that position.

"The kids contained Coughlin well and pushed them back several times. We were in it all the way in the first half which ended 3-0. Our fumble on a punt recovery gave Coughlin their break and they took advantage of it. I was pleased with the boys but that doesn't help console them when they tried so hard to win."

The Crusaders put three points on the board in the second quarter when Joe Yastremski kicked a field goal when his team was stopped on the Dallas one yard line.

Both teams played a running game with Coughlin's quarterback Volpetti passing only twice and Mount Steve Federici passing only once in the first half.

Neither team's offense

did much in the first quarter until a Dallas fumble on a punt recovery gave the Crusaders the ball on the Dallas 39 yard line. The Crusaders marched to the Dallas one yard line but the Dallas defense held and Yastremski kicked the field goal.

In the third period Coughlin scored after a seven yard pass from Volpetti to Answini put them on the Dallas three yard line. Joe Parsnik went over on the next play for the touchdown.

Later in the same period, the Crusaders tried for another score but Kurt Goeringer intercepted Volpetti's pass with only 25 seconds remaining in the period.

With only five minutes left in the game Yastremski's punt return set the scene for the Crusaders next score. Parsnik carried the ball to the 19-yard line of the Mountaineers. Yurchak's pass to Yastremski was incomplete but Coughlin went to their running game and in four carries Parsnik scored. The kick

for extra point failed and the game ended with the 16-0 score.

Mountaineer Norm Bordley was held to only 40 yards rushing but, if successful in this Saturday's game with Lake-Lehman Knights, the senior back can reach the 3,000 yard mark for his three-year high school career.

The Dallas defense played an excellent game led by Mike Kern, Joe Clemson, Fred Mihal and Jerry Rollman.

"Now we have to get them up for this Saturday's game with Lake-Lehman," said Rybak. "Anything can happen in a game between these two schools. You can throw away the records for the Old Shoe game. The kids on both teams usually play their hearts out.

"Prior to the game, Parents Day ceremonies will take place at 1:30 p.m. At the time, the players will honor their parents on the field."

The game will be played at Dallas with game time at 2 p.m.

This week it's the final game for both the Knights and Mountaineers. Dallas pulled off a mild upset when it won last year. A win for Coach Ron Rybak's Big D squad would give them a 7-4 log. Coach Mike Lowery's beleaguered Knights are 2-8. Dallas appears to have all the weapons, but one thing about the Knights, they aren't short on pride.

-Dallas was victimized by poor field position all night versus Coughlin and never made serious scoring threat... "Coughlin's defense took away the things we did best. They just outkicked us. I thought we hung in there pretty well defensively, but again a couple of mental miscues helped their scoring drives," said Coach Rybak.
