

Dallas retains Old Shoe

Early in the second quarter Jim Daubert evaded several tackles and sprinted 85 yards down the sidelines for a third Dallas touchdown. Lewis kicked the extra point and Dallas went in front 20-0.

On their next possession the Mountaineers scored a fourth touchdown when Lou Baines plunged over from the two yard line to give Dallas another six points and Lewis kicked his third extra point of the game. It was Kurt

Goeringer who intercepted a Lake-Lehman pass to give the Mountaineers the ball.

The Knights put their only points on the board in the second quarter when Quarterback John Williams threw a 51 yard pass to Chip Austin to put the Knights inside the Dallas five yard line. Four plays later Chip Austin went over from the one yard line to put the score at 27-6.

Neither team scored in the third quarter but

halfway through the final quarter Lewis intercepted a Lake-Lehman pass and ran it to the Knights seven yard line. Andy Manuskus scored the Mountaineers final touchdown when Kurt Goeringer hit him with an aerial in the end zone. Lewis kicked his fourth extra point of the game.

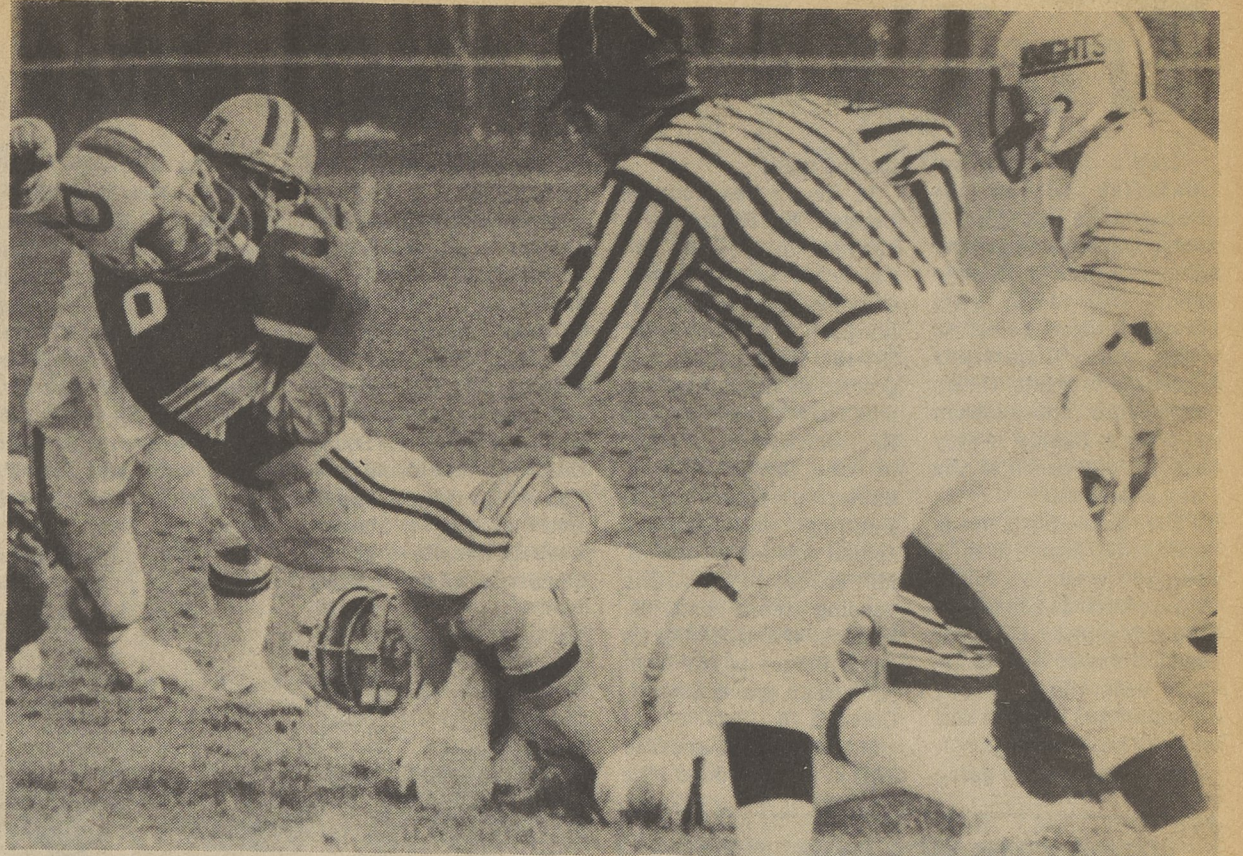
The Mountaineers had 293 yards in rushing and 98 yards in the air while losing 20 yards for a net yardage of 370. The Knights had 72 yards on

the ground and 70 yards in the air, losing 25 for a net of 117 yards.

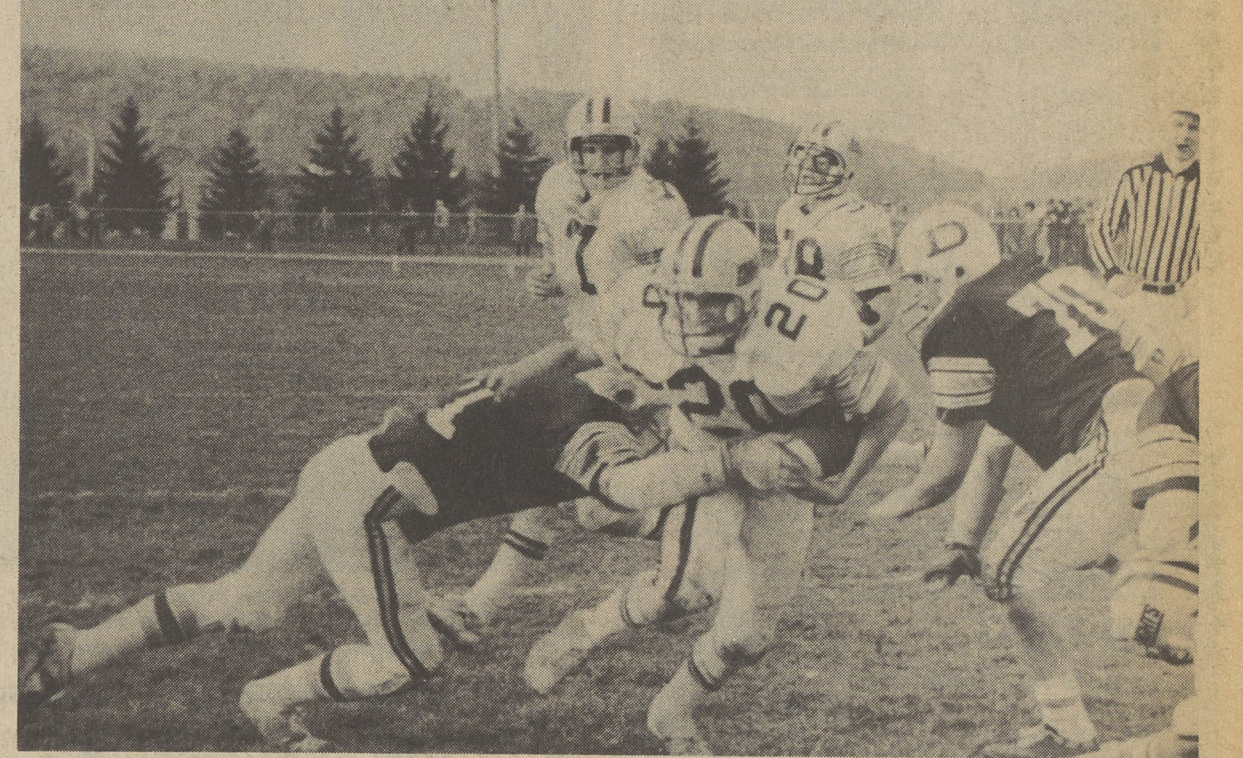
Dallas drew 13 penalties for 175 yards while the Knights had only six for 48 yards.

The win which gives the Mountaineers a season's record of 7-4, also tied them with Meyers and GAR for the Wyoming Valley Conference AA title. The Eastern Conference rating system, however, gives Meyers the Eastern Conference Middle Conference Class B title.

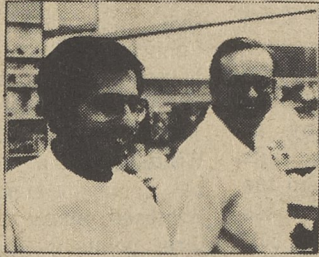
