UNICO Tournament a 'huge success' says Coach

"Even though we finished last in the competition, the tournament was a huge success," said Dallas High School Basketball Coach Clint Brobst.

"The First Annual UNICO Tournament was well organized and representatives of the organization kept everything running smoothly throughout the entire competition. They are looking forward to running another one next season."

"The competing teams, their coaches, officials and the fans were enthusiastic about the event."

The Pittston Area Patriots played excellent basketball in the title game to defeat their neighboring rival, Seton Catholic, 62-41, and take home the huge gold basketball trophy. Tom Allardyce led the Patriots with 22 points in the final contest while Mike Farrell headed the Eagles with 19.

After losing to Seton Catholic in the opening round of play, Dec. 28, the Mountaineers were downed 49-44 by the Northwest Rangers in the consolation game prior to the competition between the two Pittston teams. "In the game with Seton Catholic, I was greatly disturbed by the way our boys played," said Brobst. "I believe that the teams are comparable

but the Eagles completely out-hustled the Mountaineers.

"Despite the fact that we lost to the Rangers the boys played a much better game. They hustled more and they kept in the game all the way. Northwest is undefeated in pre-season play and our kids did a much better job than I expected after the previous game."

Northwest's Dave Dennis, high with 21 points, led his team to an early lead which they never relinquished. The Rangers outscored the Mountaineers 16-5 in the first quarter.

The Mountaineers rallied in the second period, 13-9, to come within seven points of the Rangers 25-18 halftime lead.

Both teams were off in the third period each scoring only nine points. In the final quarter with only five minutes remaining and the Rangers leading by eight, they worked the ball among them to use up time on the clock before trying for points.

"With the league season opening, our boys have to get serious and start hustling. I have several boys trying for each position so this should keep all of them on their toes. With some hard work and determination, we should have at least a 500 season," said Coach Brobst.

No increase in '82 fishing license

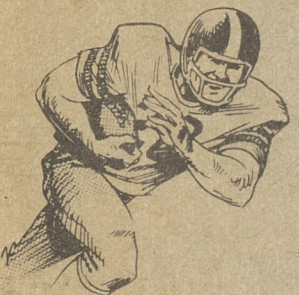
Shipment of 1982 fishing licenses by the Pennsylvania Fish Commission to over 1700 issuing agents throughout the state is about complete.

Anglers thinking about winter fishing are reminded they'll need the 1982 license beginning on Jan. 1. Licenses can be purchased at most sporting goods stores and tackle shops and all 67 county treasurers. The license issuing agents are authorized by law to collect a twenty-five cent fee for each license to cover handling and bonding costs. The licenses are also available at Fish Commission offices and at most Commission

exhibits set up at numerous sports and outdoor shows throughout the year.

Ralph W. Abele, executive director of the Commission, noted that the license fees remain the same as last year...\$9 for a resident 16 yrs. of age or older; \$2 for a senior resident license beginning at age 65; senior lifetime resident (age 65 and up) for \$10; non-resident age 16 and up at \$14; and \$9 for a tourist license which is good for seven consecutive days. The optional senior lifetime license is available only from County Treasurers and the Fish Commission.

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
