LL School Board passes budget

The Lake-Lehman School Board, passed a \$6,497,799 budget for the 1982-83 school year which will add seven mills to local real estate taxes. The increase brings the millage total for Lake-Lehman property owners to 98 mills. This translates into about \$70 per \$10,000 assessment.

Expenses for the district are up \$492,707 from last year with the biggest increases in instructional and fixed charges, such as insurances and retirement benefits, both over

\$100,000. Cuts were made in the areas of operation and maintenance, student activities and capital outlay, totaling \$40,453. Total revenues from local, state and federal sources equal \$6,187,901. A beginning fund balance of \$309,898 makes up the difference in revenues and expenditures.

Other local sources of income are a \$10 per capita tax, one half percent earned income tax, one percent real estate transfer tax, \$10 occupational privilege tax and \$10

mechanical device tax.

The budget was passed unanimously by the board at its regular monthly meeting held Thursday, June 10. H.A. Berkheimer Associates was named collector for the earned income, occupational privilege, mechanical device and delinquent taxes. Real Estate taxes will continue to be brought in through local municipal collectors, and the Recorder of Deeds for Luzerne and Wyoming Counties is responsible for the real estate transfer tax.
