



Lake-Lehman and Dallas tie



Dallas got its tally on the next possession when Walsh connected with Piekanski covvering 44 yards. Walsh went to big Steve Thomas for the two-pointer. Over four minutes remained in the contest. Dallas

made a last ditch effort to win the game, but Steve Hagenbach, Eric Masters and Kevin Straka all met at the QB on a fourth and nine attempt.
