Final budget action planned

Franklin Township supervisors will meet tomorrow night at 8 in the basement of the Orange United Methodist Church at which time the board will take final action on the proposed 1983 Franklin Township budget.

The proposed budget, initially read at the board's Dec. 6 meeting, calls for some new highs in spending and receipts. Supervisors anticipate revenue from various taxes on Franklin Township residents, revenue sharing funds from the federal government and receipts from the state highway aid fund in the amount of \$101,478.16, with a like amount budgeted for expenditures.

The budget continues the same amount of levy

on real estate in Franklin Township, eight mills, as is in effect this year and also includes the several 'nuisance' taxes such as the one percent wage tax which is shared equally with the Dallas School District; the one percent tax on realty transfers, and the per capita tax.

The budget has been open for public inspection Franklin Township taxpayers and other interested persons since Dec. 9 by 'appointment only' at the home of Mrs. Sandra L. Race, Orange.

In addition to taking final action on the proposed 1983 budget, Franklin Township supervisors will accept written and oral comments and

suggestions regarding the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of \$9,891.

Budget comment: The proposed 1983 budget for Franklin Township carries salary increases of nine percent for all township employees, including Franklin Township Police Chief Richard Bartholomew, whose salary will increase to \$3,900 from the present \$3,600. Bartholomew works part-time as Franklin Township police chief. His full time position as a supervisor at Air Products in Hanover Township prohibits his working during the day and calls for police

assistance during day are usually referred to the state police at Wyoming Barracks.

Township Road Supervisor Willard Race, also a member of the board; his father, Russell Race, Sr., another member of the board, and a cousin David Rought, all of whom are employed by the township's road department, will receive salary increases of nine percent starting Jan. 1. Each also received a seven percent raise in salary during the current year. In addition to their salaries, all three are covered by Blue Cross at township expense, costing Franklin Township taxpayers \$225 per month.

Board also approved a nine percent salary increase for Mrs. Sandra L. Race, township secretary, from \$2,860 to \$3,117.40 per year. Mrs. Race also receives compensation for telephone expense and transportation costs. Amounts budgeted in the 1983 budget include \$200 for her transportation and \$30 for telephone expense in her home.

Expense items budgeted for the township police chief in addition to his new proposed salary of \$3,900 as a part-time officer, include \$800 for transportation (use of his private car on official duty), and \$225 for telephone expense in his home.
