

# A trip through an ambulance

Twenty seven students in Mrs. Marsha Spears third grade class at Dallas Elementary School were visited recently by volunteer members of the

Dallas Ambulance Organization.

Members of the ambulance crew brought the ambulance and took the students inside the

vehicle. They explained the various items and supplies such as splints, oxygen tanks, and a wheelchair used to take people from their homes

to the ambulance, as well as the stretcher. They also demonstrated many of the pieces of equipment used in treatment of patients such as the cervical collar, and the kinds of suction used for nausea, choking infants, and other difficulties.

The volunteers explained the training needed to serve with the ambulance such as CPR and advanced First Aid. One of the students asked Mrs. Susan Stine, ambulance nurse, if she ever had to deliver a baby and she explained that she did.

The third grade students learned about the ambulance service as part of their education in community service. It was the first time such a demonstration had been presented at the Borough Elementary School.

Among other community personnel speaking to the class was Police Officer Clarke Van Orden, who explained his duties as a patrolman.

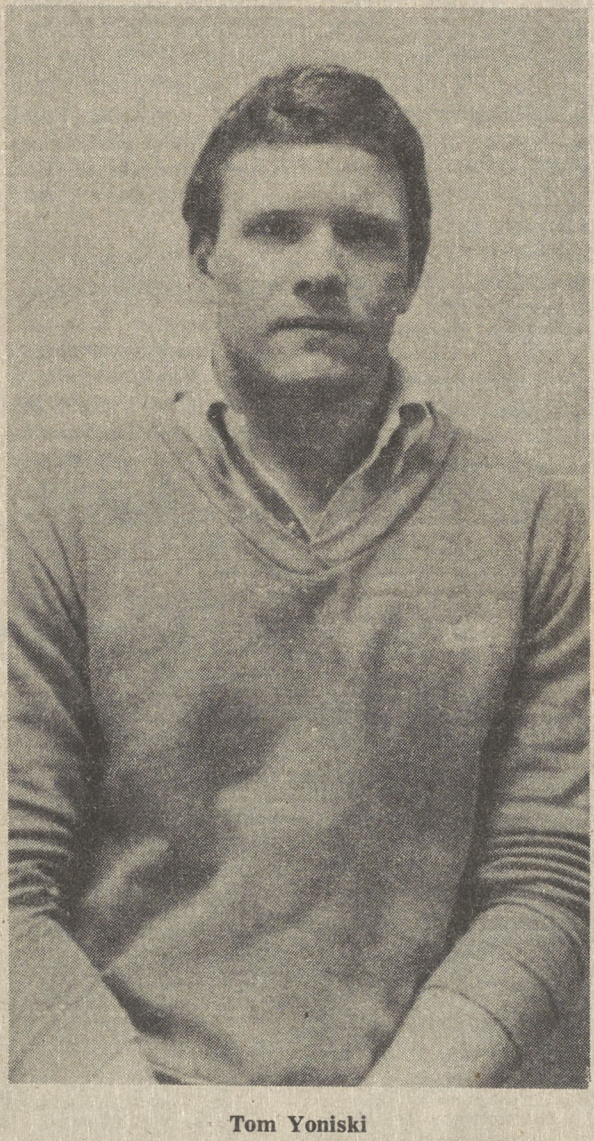
