





The new Pennsylvania Dog Law recently enacted provides for licensing fees of \$5 for productive dogs and \$3 for spayed or neutered animals. Senior citizens who apply in person must pay only

\$2.75 for productive dogs and \$1.75 for those spayed or neutered.

Owners of guide dogs, hearing dogs, or other aid dogs are not subject to license fees but their animals must be licensed.

Licenses are available through the County Treasurer's Office or one of their authorized agents.

A 25 cents agency fee is added if purchased outside the Treasurer's Office.
