Homemade Candy Easter Eggs Are a Tradition for the Iorios

Each year at Easter time, making homemade candy eggs is a tradition at the Iorios. Penny Iorio uses recipes that have been in her family for two generations.

When Penny was growing up on the day before Easter her mother would make the Easter eggs, with the children helping. When the eggs were completed, each child had the opportunity to decorate the eggs as he or she desired, writing their names on them with colored icing.

With price of candy now so high, Penny has found making her own Easter candy a great way to cut corners. This year, as in the past, she will carry on the tradition with her own

six children: Betsy, 16, a junior at Dallas Senior High; Sandy, 15, a freshman at West Side Tech; Denise, 12, a sixth grader at Dallas Intermediate School; John Jr., 10 a third grader at Westmoreland Elementary School; Eugene (Gino) a second grader at Westmoreland Elementary School and Christopher, 3 years old.

Penny, her husband John, and their family live in Fernbrook. Penny, who is originally from Norristown, moved to the area when she was married 19 years ago. Penny helps in the circulation department at the Dallas Post.

readers. Surprise your family and start a great family tradition at the same time by making your own Easter candy this year. How could they resist delicious coconut cream eggs or rich buttermilk eggs? Just one word of caution, better make them the day before Easter or they might not last until the holiday. Happy Easter!

COCONUT EASTER EGGS
2 boxes 10 x sugar
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
4 T. cream
1 bag shredded coconut

ingredients together and form into an egg shape. Dip in chocolate. (recipe follows)

BUTTER CREAM EASTER EGGS
½ lb. butter
8 oz. cream cheese
3 boxes 10 x sugar
½ t. vanilla

Cream butter and cream cheese together. Add vanilla. Gradually blend in sugar. Cool for at least one hour. Shape into ovals for Easter eggs. Return to the refrigerator before coating. Dip eggs in chocolate, place on wax paper until chocolate is firm. When chocolate is firm, decorate as desired.

CHOCOLATE COATING
8 oz. semi-sweet chocolate
2 in. square paraffin wax
1 T. butter

Melt ingredients over hot water. Dip each cooled piece of candy into chocolate (use a fork or skewer). Place on waxed paper covered cake rack until cooled and chocolate is firm. Refrigerate again.

Keep chocolate warm enough to coat quickly. One bag of coconut or ½ cup peanut butter may be added for flavoring, if desired. Makes about 100 eggs (small). Recipe may be cut in half for 50 eggs. Decorate if desired.
