Valley West Expands Courses

Wyoming Valley West High School has offered a computer math course for more than 10 years. Recently, the school expanded this elective math program with the purchase of nine TRS-80 computers from Radio Shack. Students are given "hands on" experience with the computers and a better understanding of computer languages.

In the past several years, Wyoming Valley West's computer math

course has grown from four classes to 10 one-semester classes per year, with a student to computer ratio of two to one. This class is taken, not in place of another math course, but in addition to or as a supplement to the required math courses—a fact which was commended in the recent Middle States Evaluation procedure.

According to "An Agenda for Action," published by the national Council of Teachers of Mathematics, "A computer literacy course, familiarizing the student with the role and impact of the computer, should be a part of the general education of every student." This recommendation for the 1980's math courses has been emphasized since the introduction of the micro-computer.

Upon successful completion of the Wyoming Valley West computer math course, the student will be able to use all of the computer equipment associated

with the TRS-80 Micro-computing System, to write programs in the BASIC computer language and to store them into the computer's memory on diskettes or cassettes, and to solve problems applying BASIC programming. This computer course also provides enrichment for the students through their individual studies via the computer.

According to Mr. John LaNunziata, one of the school's computer math instructors, this computer math class is an "essential part of an academic student's entrance into college." Many colleges now require basic computer literacy. Wyoming Valley West alumni have reported that their computer math course proved to be useful when they moved on to college study.

Since the invention of the micro-computer, man has become increasingly aware of the fact that knowledge of computer operation is vital to his future. Expansion of the curriculum and of

computer software is seen necessary in the near future. An advanced computer math class is now being considered. This class would offer the student a more detailed manipulation of programming and computer language, including Fortran IV. The future also holds, for the computer itself, a conversion from cassette data storage to disc storage. This change would increase the computer's capacity to store programming information.

Chairman of the Wyoming Valley West High School mathematics department, Mr. Joseph A.F. Opalski, and computer instructors, John LaNunziata and Richard Furman, have each gained first-hand experience in this area. In this day and age, each one of these competent instructors feels that the computer math course is essential in the lives of our students, for computers are becoming as commonplace as television sets.
