Townhouse Issue Still Unsolved

A group of residents representing those people who reside in the East Center Hill Road, Church Street and Claude Street areas of Dallas attended the Dallas Township Planning Commission meeting recently. The Dallas Post, in its June 1 edition, informed the public of a proposal to build 16 townhouses in an area bounded by these three streets, an area of single unit housing.

Atty. Frank Townend opened the meeting by informing the group that Sobock and Lindquist, who had proposed to build the dwellings, required more time and required postponement. It was agreed to delay further discussions until the July 19 meeting.

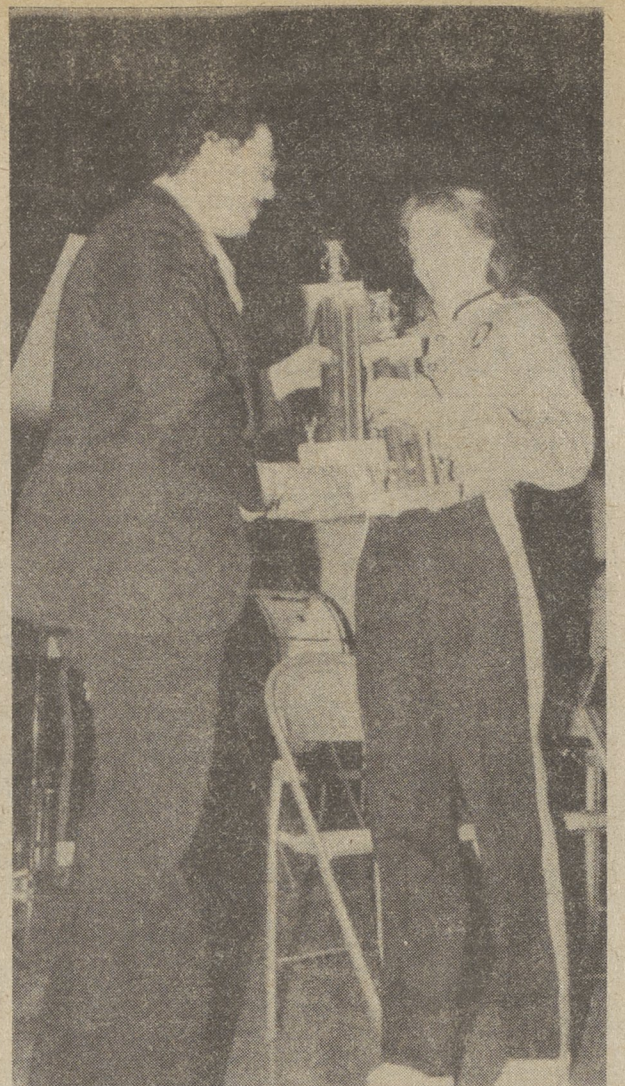
In the absence of the developers, specific questions relating to the type of development and related issues such as utilities, traffic, access etc could not be dealt with at this time.

Mrs. Debbie Hadzor presented a petition signed by 90 percent of the residents in the immediate area protesting the building of 16 row houses in two

acres of land. The commission took note of the petition and agreed to notify the residents of any change of hearing. From questions asked by residents at the meeting, it was clear that up to 16 three-bedroom dwellings was considered to be an unacceptable load on existing water supply, sewerage facilities and available roads. Many of those present expressed concern at the loss of privacy and potential danger to children from increased traffic.

In response to a question from resident Paul Hodges, Atty. Townend explained that the area had been zoned R 3 (to include multiple dwellings) in 1965, but was unable to comment on the relevancy of the zoning code to the area as it is now.

The Planning Commission meeting continued while the residents met outside and expressed their resentment and feeling of helplessness in what they felt was an unreasonable situation. One resident stated she could not understand how the law could permit such a dense level of residency in a rural town like Dallas.
