The seminar is being sponsored by the Luzerne-Wyoming County Mental Health Center.

Seminar Will Help Parents And Teens

More than ever, the American family is becoming an endangered species. The pressures that adolescence places on a young person and his family are growing each day. Teenagers are experiencing trouble at home, in school, with drugs and alcohol, with the legal and law enforcement systems, and with themselves.

In order to help parents effectively deal with or avoid troubled teenage behavior, a seminar featuring Phyllis and David York, founder of "Toughlove" has been scheduled. "Something More Than Love...Surviving Troubled Teenage Behavior" will be held Thursday, Sept. 22 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Genetti's Best Western Motor Inn in Wilkes-Barre.

The seminar is sponsored by the Luzerne-Wyoming County Mental Health Center and has been endorsed by the Wyoming Valley Toughlove Chapter. A panel of legal and mental health professionals, led by the Honorable Chester Muroski, (Court of Common Pleas, Luzerne County) will lead off the morning session. Judge Muroski will discuss Legal Aspects of Adolescent Behavior, followed by discussions of Drug and Alcohol Abuse; Family Therapy Interventions; and Behavior Management Techniques. This panel discussion is designed to give parents alternatives and options that can be

used to avoid, minimize or confront problem teenage behavior.

Phyllis and David York, founders of Toughlove, will present their strategies for dealing with problem behaviors in the family during the afternoon session. The Yorks are family counselors who have extensive experience with drug and alcohol counseling, family systems management and parental support networks. They are consultants to Toughlove chapters throughout the nation, and have appeared on many national and local television program such as the "Phil Donahue Show."

The Yorks emphasize the development of parental strengths and shifting the focus of responsibility for proper behavior to the teenager. They help local Toughlove chapters organize and maintain a network of support and encouragement to those parents who have problems with their children. The panel and the Yorks will also offer realistic strategies that can help prevent or reduce adolescent problems from arising.
