New tapes being requested currently are "A.I.D.S.," 'Poison Ivy," "Tracheotomy," and "Diet Pills."

Now that the new Parenting Tapes are available to the public for just the cost of a phone call, they will also be used as a guide as to where help is needed.

Help comes in large doses from this office in the form of Jan Jones writing an information guide for Back Mountain youngsters entitled "Who Says There's Nothing To Do!" to Jane Becker helping a distraught mother whose has lost a child to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. No problem is too big, or too small, for these gals to handle.
