Dallas stops GAR, 7-0

"Our defense was fantastic; they controlled the game," said Dallas football coach Ron Rybak after the Mountaineers 7-0 shutout over GAR. "Our offense moved the ball against the Grenadiers but they made too many mental mistakes.

"Mike Borton was great on offense. He isn't the biggest nor the fastest back in the conference but pound for pound I'd say he is the best back in the Valley. It doesn't matter how big the guys are who come after him; he keeps moving ahead. John Farrell was playing backup and did a splendid job for us.

"Joe Walsh and Greg Manusky were outstanding on defense but the entire defense played a great game. I could name everyone of them.

"Borton gained nearly 100 yards in the game and Joe Simon played a great game."

The only score in the game came in the first quarter on a G.A.R. fumble. The Grenadiers took a Dallas punt on their five-yard line but two plays later fumbled the ball. Mountaineer Joe Ostrowski recovered it and on the next play Mount John Farrell went

through the left side of the line and into the end zone for a score. Darren Ford's kick for the extra point was good and the Mounts went in front 7-0.

The Mountaineers' offense controlled the ball and knocked on the door several times but were unable to score. Mike Borton led the offense in yardage and QB Bernie Walsh completed three-for-eight passes for 58 yards.

The Grenadiers' defense deserves a lot of credit for they held the Dallas offense throughout three quarters.

Rybak's defense completely controlled the Grenadiers and turned in a stellar performance. In fact, it was the defense led by Greg Manusky who turned in the only score to give the Mounts their 7-0 win.

"We have a week off before we meet Pittston which will give us a rest. Tim Grove will be back and so will Tim Lyons. Tucker was back for the GAR game but this extra week will be good for him as well. He played in the GAR game and as soon as they saw him on the field they put two men on him.

"If our defense plays as well against Pittston as they did last Saturday, we will be in good shape. Pittston will be up for us, they always are," added Rybak.

Meyers gets by Knights

"A dropped touchdown pass and missing two extrapoints - that's what killed us," said Lake-Lehman grid coach Mark Kirk after his Knights' 21-20 loss to the Meyers Mohawks last Friday.

"We didn't make the right plays to stop Meyers near the end of the game. We knew what they planned to do, but our boys made too many mental mistakes. We would have won if we had played good football in the first half.

"Our kickoff in the final minutes of the game hurt us. Our specialty team consists of all young players and they make too many mistakes. The Mohawks took the ball and ran it back more than 25 yards to their 45 yard line. We need to make some changes on our specialty teams."

The Knights contained the Mohawks fast-running back Dwayne Harrison fairly well despite his chalking up 135 yards. Most of that yardage was gained in about three long runs and Harrison accounted for two of Meyers TD's.

"He's a good back," said Kirk. "We couldn't get him when it counted."

Both teams played to a scoreless tie in the first quarter. In the second period, the Mohawks drove down field from their 14 to Lake-Lehman's 28, but fumbled on the play.

The Knights countered by driving to the Mohawks 30 yard line but following a penalty gave up the ball on the Mohawks 30 yard line.

Meyers put the first score on the board on Harrison's first TD and Belgian exchange student Wim Peters kicked the extra point. The Mohawks scored their second TD on a 25 yard pass from QB Chris Hunsinger to Jeff Lott in the end zone. Peters kicked his second extra point to give the Mohawks a 14-0 lead.

The Knights took over and drove 80 yards to make the score 14-6 when T.J. Cadwalder hit Earl Weidner with a 36-yard pass for a score. The Knights' pass for two points failed which cost them the ball game.

Late in the third period, Chris Wargo recovered a Meyers fumble at the Mohawk 10-yard line. On second down, Jeff Martin took the ball to the five and on third and five Stu Thomas took it in for the score. Cadwalder hit Weidner for a two

point conversion pass. Another fumble set up the Knights third score. Ed Gavlick recovered the Meyers fumble and six plays later Martin took the ball in from the Mohawks nine yard line. The pass for a two point conversion failed.

Harrison tied the score at 20 each when he went in for a TD with only 2:38 remaining on the clock. Peters made his third point for the day to give the Mohawks the 21-20 win.

"We have two weeks off before we meet Crestwood," said Kirk. "The layoff will help us. The kids need the rest and it will give us time to teach them some new techniques. We plan to do some intensive teaching during that time.

"Our kids are doing a great job. They're young and inexperienced but for a small school they are very competitive. Many people fail to realize we have only about 400 students in the senior high.

"All the boys are working hard and John Williams, Jeff Martin and Chris Wargo have been turning in some fine performances. Four of our next five games are with Division AA schools. Only Nanticoke is triple A but they'll all be tough."
