Morgan named to foundation

Roy E. Morgan, general manager and executive vice president of WILK Radio, has been elected to the Board of Directors of the Appalachian Foundation.

The new Foundation met in Washington recently to elect officers and adopt a 1984 action program.

The Appalachian Foundation is the first community foundation designed to serve an entire region. It is a three-way partnership among the states, business, and labor in the Appalachian Region.

The Foundation Board voted to target private sector involvement in public education in its 1984 action plan. A "school-to-work" conference is scheduled for later in the year.

The Board also approved Foundation sponsorship of an Appalachian Clearinghouse, a computer-assisted data retrieval system on the wide variety of non-profit service delivery organizations in the 13-state Appalachian Region. A membership plan for broad-based private sector participation in the work of the Foundation was also approved.

Lawrence S. Stinchcomb, a seven-year veteran of the community foundation movement, was named President of the Appalachian Foundation.
