Lake-Lehman girls' basketball team fought even longer than usual last Wednesday night, but came up on the short end of a 35-34 overtime score in PIAA ClassAA basketball playoffs at North Schuylkill High School. The Lady Knights were defeated by the girls from York Catholic High School.

The Lehman girls enjoyed a 31-23 lead halfway through the final period, but watched that lead disappear via a full-court press from York Catholic.

York Catholic's senior guard JoAnne Stephens tied the game at

34-all with two free throws with a little over one minute showing on the clock. Both teams missed field

goals attempts during the final minute, sending the game in a three-minute overtime period.

With more than a minute remaining in the overtime period, the York Catholic team rebounded a Lake-Lehman missed shot and York's Ronnie Holland was fouled when attempting a lay-up shot.

Holland, who made the first shot from the free-throw stripe but missed the second, was the only player to score during the extra period. Her successful free throw, however, was just enough to give York the victory and the opportunity to advance toward the 1984 state title.


