# **Students take part in Fitness Program**

The fourth, fifth and sixth grade students at the Lake-Noxen Elementary School recently participated in the AAHPERD Youth Fitness Pro-

gram. The program is designed to improve the fitness level of American boys and girls ages 10-18. The test was the first ever to be devel-

oped by the physical education profession and is basked on national norms.

The students are tested on six different events and their results are compared to the national norms for students their own ages.

The six events are: 50-year dash which tests speed; long-distance run which tests endurance; standing broad jump which tests leg strength; shuttle run which tests how fast a student can start and stop; sit-ups which test abdominal strength; and pull-up for boys and flexed arm-hang for girls which tests arm strength.

If a student can score 85 percent or above on all six tests, they receive the President's Physical Fitness Award. If a student can score 80 percent or above on all six tests, they receive the Gold Merit Award. If a student can score 50 percent or above on all six tests, they receive an Achievement Award.
