High school juniors are encouraged to pick up applications for

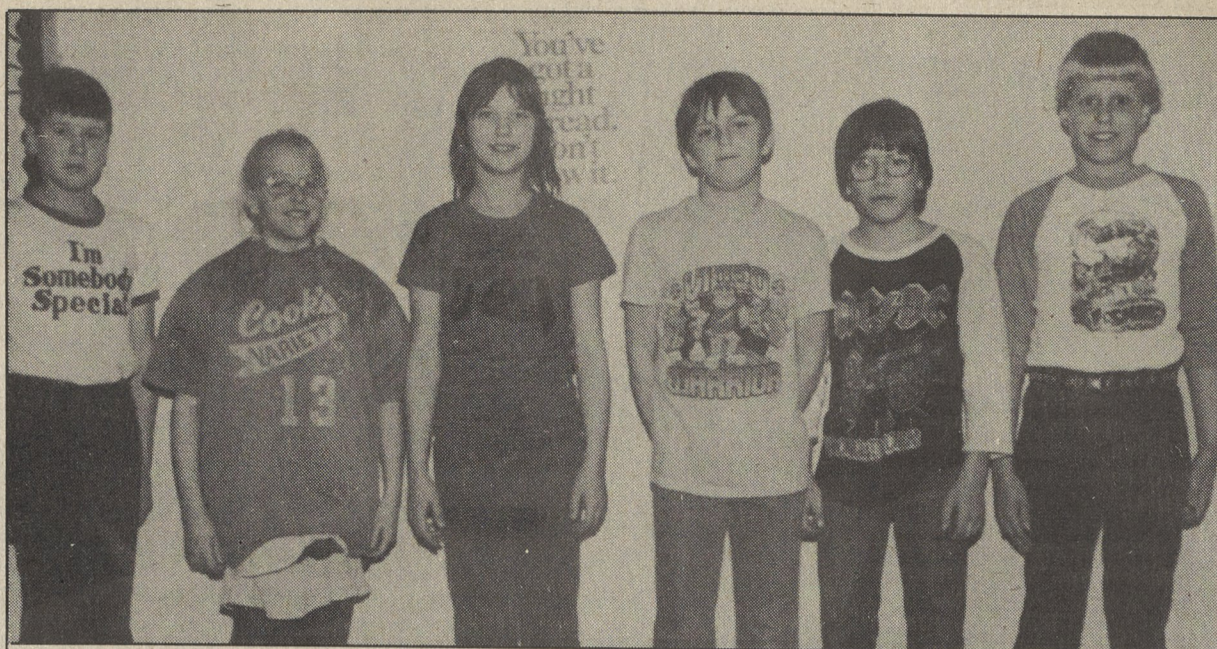
nomination to any of the four military academies for the classes

A program entitled "The Family of God" was held recently at the Idetown United Methodist Church under the leadership of Mrs. Shirley Mahle.

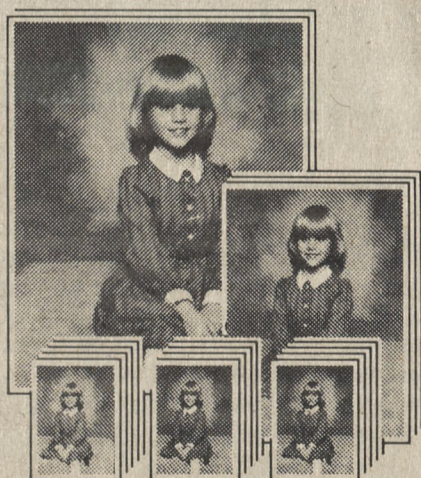
