board approves contract

At the regular meeting of the Lake-Lehman School Board held last Tuesday, the directors approved a new three-year contract for the district's teachers and service personnel. Under the new contract, the teachers and the custodians will receive a six percent increase. Food service personnel will receive a two and one half percent increase. The contract also calls for an additional 13 percent increase in benefits.

The directors also approved a recommendation to authorize Smith and Miller Associates to draw up bid specifications for the replace-

representative of Smith and Miller, told the board the boilers are in very poor condition. 
