**Vaccine shortage develops**

A shortage of DTP vaccine (Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis) has developed. In Pennsylvania, supplies of DTP vaccine in public clinics are still adequate, but some private physicians and their suppliers are running out of the vaccine. In consultation with the Pennsylvania Department of Health, the Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics advises parents whose physicians can not obtain DTP vaccine during the shortage period to go to the nearest public clinic for immunization.

Vaccine manufacturers have experienced increased costs because of liability suits brought by parents who believe their children suffered adverse effects from the life-saving vaccine. One manufacturer, Wyeth Laboratories, announced June 13 that it had discontinued the production and distribution of DTP vaccine. Another vaccine manufacturer, Squibb-Connought, is having difficulty obtaining insurance to cover marketing DTP vaccine. The remaining manufacturer, Lederle, has announced plans to increase its production capacity to respond to the increased demand for the vaccine, but will not have additional supplies available for 6 to 8 months due to manufacturing and testing requirements.

The American Academy of Pediatrics is working with parents groups, vaccine manufacturers and members of Congress to develop legislation to properly compensate the small number of children who suffer adverse effects from vaccine medications so that the medications will not be denied to the much larger group of children who will be protected from death and disability by using the vaccines. Senate Bill 2116 and House Resolution 5810 are the product of this effort. While working to identify other remedies, this organization of pediatricians also urges swift passage of federal law to permit vaccine manufacturers to return to normal production as soon as possible.

The Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics is an organization of over 1,000 pediatricians dedicated to the health, safety and well-being of infants, children and young adults in Pennsylvania.

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**WVIA-TV gets grant**

Congressman Joseph M. McDade has announced that WVIA-TV, the public broadcasting outlet for Northeastern Pennsylvania, has been awarded a federal grant which will allow the purchase of \$52,000 in needed equipment.

The congressman said that the \$39,000 grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration will be coupled by WVIA-TV with \$13,000 from other sources to purchase the equipment.

Dr. John F. Walsh, president and general manager of WVIA-TV, said the grant is a "tremendous boost to our capital fund drive which is now being carried out so we can replace antiquated equipment."

He added that funds realized from the drive will be used to satisfy the \$13,000 in matching funds required under the terms of the federal grant. The capital fund campaign began earlier this year, he said.

Dr. Walsh said the \$52,000 will make possible the purchase and installation of new equipment at the

station's Public Broadcasting Center in Pittston which will eliminate undesirable "picture roll" when external signals are switched in the control room during broadcasting.

The grant to WVIA-TV, McDade said, is being made under the federal government's Public Telecommunications Facilities Program.
