Michael DiPaolo, cousin of the bridegroom, was ring bearer and was attired in a white tuxedo to match the groom.

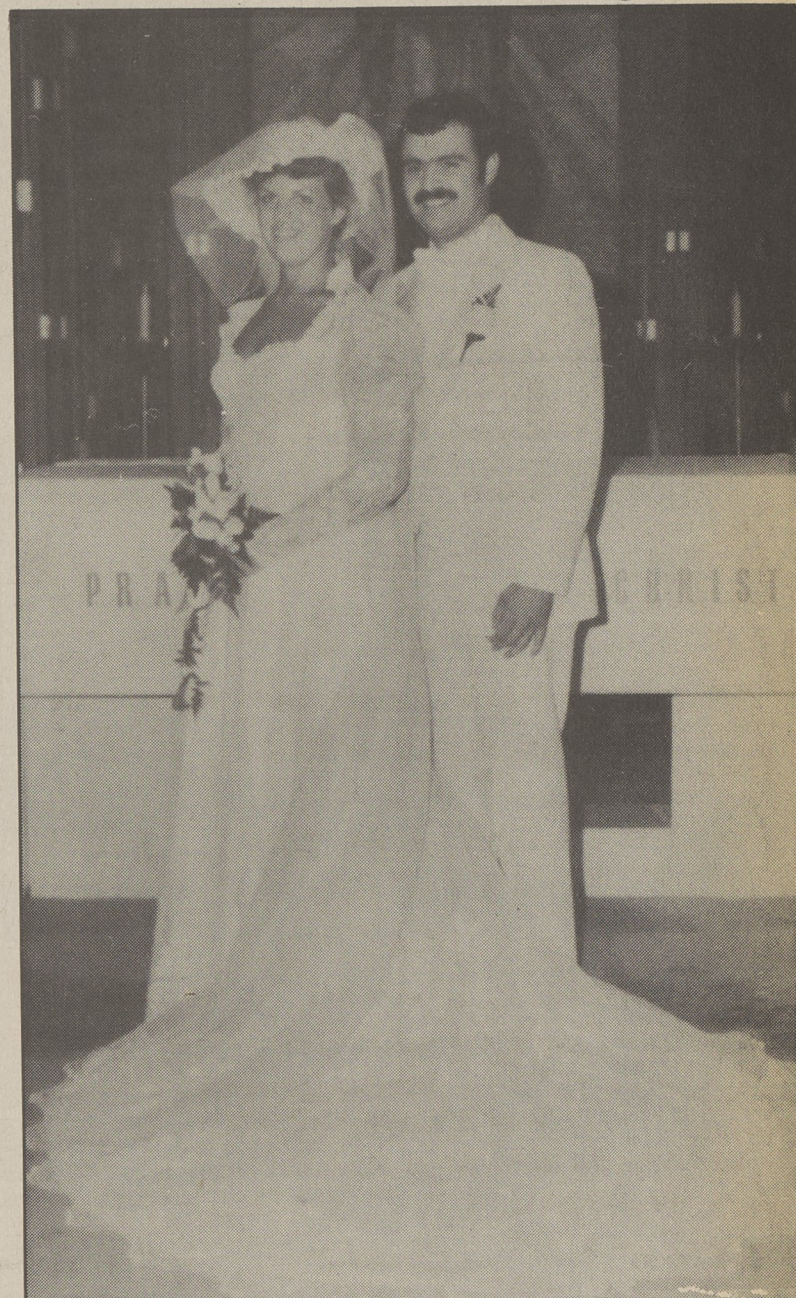

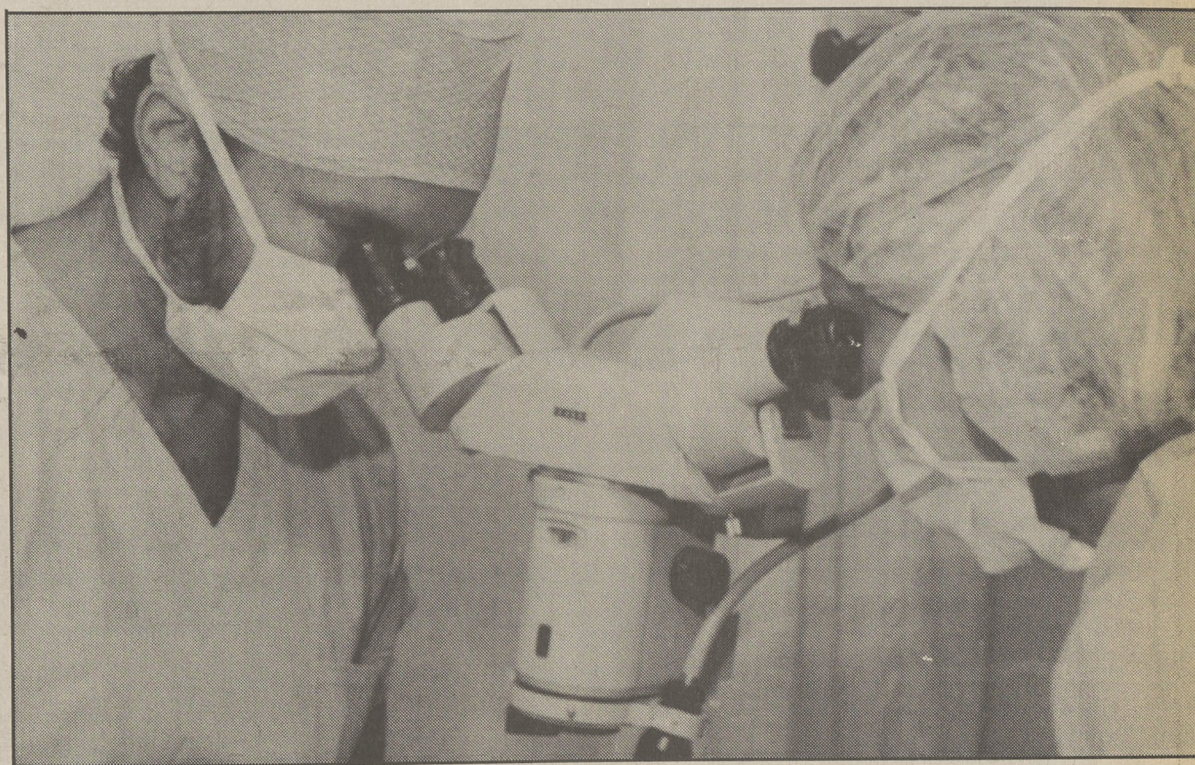

Microsurgery

Microsurgery at Nesbitt Memorial Hospital has been greatly facilitated by the hospital's recent purchase of the top of the line Zeiss operating microscope. The Zeiss operating microscope enables magnification of the surgical operating fields up to 24 times their normal size. It will be used for reversal of tubal ligation, repair of blocked tubes, and multiple neurosurgical procedures.

The microscope allows two physicians to operate together on the same magnified operating field. Shown here, Dr. Harry Reich, a Dallas resident and Sandy Salko, Operating Room Head Nurse, demonstrate the use of the new Zeiss operative fertility microscope.

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
