Yencha receives Youth Award

The Penn Mountains Council of the Boy Scouts of America have announced that Andrew Yencha of Troop 232 has won the Dewitt Wallace-Reader's Digest Youth in America Leadership Award.

Andrew first qualified for the leadership award at the troop level in his Troop 232, Gate of Heaven Church, Dallas. Then he won for his district, the west side, and the Council, the whole Wyoming Valley. He is presently entered in the competition for his region which represents several Northeastern states.

Andy won the medal for outstanding leadership given to his troop in carrying out a very ambitious scouting program and in doing many public service projects with the troop, among which wer a conservation project for the YMCA, an international education project for College Misericordia, and several instructional programs for the Girl Scouts. Andy was also selected because of his broad interests and achievements.

In recognition of his award, Andy was chosen as the representative of area youth to address the 800 community leaders assembled for the United Way Campaign dinner.


Andy is an Eagle Scout, member of the Order of the Arrow, a winner of the World Conservation Award and Senior Patrol Leader of his troop.

Receiving the Eagle Award at the age of 16, Andy was presented at a Court of Honor at College Misericordia on Sept. 30. The Eagle award, the highest award in scouting, is attained by only one out of every 100 boys who enter scouting.

Andy's Eagle project was to set up, train and lead the Guide Program for the Window on the World Education Program. Andy was also responsible for registration. Under his leadership 35 scouts and college students registered and guided 300 young people through three Saturday programs. Andy was responsible for the movement of a total of 1,000 young people. He and his volunteers put in over 400 service hours in his project. This was a substantial leadership achievement and a significant public service.

He also holds the World Conservation Award, and is a member of the Order of the Arrow. This summer Andy was one of six young people chosen from all across the country to be a member of the Student Conservation Corps to work with the National Park Service at Lassen Volcano National Park in California.

As Senior Patrol Leader of Troop 232, Andy leads a troop of 30 boys with his Scoutmaster Dr.

participated in cross country for two years. He enjoys the life sciences and hopes to pursue a career in Environmental Science or Forestry.

He is currently looking at sev-eral colleges in the Northeast for next year. In the summer, Andy works as a pioneering instructor and lifeguard at the Wilkes Barre YMCA's Camp Kresge.

Andy resides with his parents, Andrew and Bernadine Yencha and his sister Vicki in Midway Manor, Trucksville.





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
