Commission halts action

During the 164th meeting of the Pennsylvania Fish Commission held Oct. 22, the Commission postponed action on a motion that would have established a point system for the purpose of license revocation, denial, or loss of privileges for anglers and boaters in violation of rules and regulations of the Fish and Boat Code. The Commission tabled the motion and requested Commission staff to consider revisions in the regulation from its present form.

The Commission also approved the following for final adoption:

-Provision to establish guidelines for issuing agent to determine bon-afide residents of Pennsylvania.

-Prohibition of the use of gasolinepowered generators to power electric motors on Commission-owned lakes.

-Clarification of the use of inflatable boats on Commission-owned

-Regulations concerning the commercial use of Commission access

-Prohibition on fishing within or in the immediate vicinity of a fish passage device.
