You can set up a budget that will see you through not only the next month but into the future, whether that includes a new home, education for your children, or a comfortable retirement.

"Families Managing Money in the 80's," a learn-at-home program offered by The Penn State Extension Service will help you organize all important financial and legal papers into a file system; to determine just what your family's net worth is now and what your family's goals are for the future; to set up a usable spending and saving plan, and to establish a credit his-

The program, developed by Extension specialsits at The Pennsylvania State University is made up of five mini-lessons and is offered free of charge. Topics include a system for important papers, what and where; measuring financial progress; achieving financial priorities; and system for saving and spending and credit management.

Those who complete all five lessons will receive a free copy of Penn State Extension's "Getting Organized," a 48-page book of information and forms that will help to keep tabs on your family financial matters (a \$3.00 value).
