Darling led the Mountaineers offense in the second half tossing in 12 of his 18 points. Mark Farrell and Steve Wilson hit 15 and 12 points respectively putting in some key shots in the first half

The Mountaineers took an early 14-6 lead at the end of the first period and went in front 31-16 at halftime. Farrell put in nine points and Wilson hit for eight points in the

first half to lead in the scoring. The Dallas defense played exceptionally well as they held down the Mohawks shooting and forced them in to early foul trouble.

Darling also led the Mountaineers in rebounds with 14.

It was Farrell who led the scoring in the game with Seton Catholic, keying in 12 of his 19 points in the second half. Darling put in six of his 10 points in the second half to give Dallas a 35-25 scoring lead in the third and fourth periods

The Mountaineers outscored the Eagles 13-5 in the first period and held them to only two points in the second while they poured in eight. Taking a 21-10 lead into the lockerroom at the half, the Mountaineers hit 12 to the Eagles eight points in the third and 23 to their 17 in the final period.
