

# LL wrestlers roll over unbeaten Meyers

The Lake-Lehman wrestling team defeated previously unbeaten Meyers 25-19 Wednesday. Dave Guzenski started the Black Knights rolling with a pin over Charlie Leo of Meyers at 112 lb. Other winners for Lehman were Don Spencer who decisioned Bob Thomas 8-5 a great 6-5 decision by Ed Statford over Willie Norton and a 5-0 decision by Norm Clancy over Dave Kratz.
